Dayton Rubber Is Sponsoring Team; Tucker Is Coach

Five Additional Men Can Be Used By The Team Under League Regulations

The Western North Carolina basketball league opened last night, with teams from eight towns represented in the loop. The Dayton Rubber Manufacturing Company will have the entry from Waynesville.

Ned Tucker is coach of the team, and John McConnell is manager. Ten candidates for berths have been practicing on the court at the Hazelwood school, and all games will be played at the Armory. The schedule calls for two games each week, on Wednesday and Saturday nights. The schedule further provides for a home game and a game on the road each week.

Mr. Tucker said yesterday that there are openings for five more players, as each team will be allowed 15 players under terms of the league.

The Dayton Rubber Manufacturing Company has provided uniforms, shoes and basketballs for the team. Those interested in joining the team should contact Mr. Tucker at once. The first games of the season were played last night.

Three Bears Killed In 2 Sherwood Forest Hunts

Although a total of 20 bears ranging in size from 100 to 400 pounds have been seen during the first two of the scheduled six bear hunts in the Sherwood Forest Wildlife area, only three have been killed, it was learned here through various club members participating in the first two hunts.

Members of the Pigeon Valley Bear Hunting Club, drawing the first hunt of the season—Nov. 23—saw and chased a total of 17 bears and downed a trio in the rugged Sherwood area. Two weighed between 130 and 175 pounds each, while the third one tipped the scales at approximately 200. Two of the smaller kills were recorded by Carl Johnson and Jack Blankenship opening day while H. K. Williams, club secretary, dropped the 300-pounder during the second hunt as he attempted to cross a mountain highway about 350 yards away. It was the first bear ever seen during an open hunting season by Williams and the first he ever shot.

J. B. Riedon, Jr., Bethel merchant, drawing the second two-day hunt of the season—Nov. 6-7—took his party of hunters into the mountains Tuesday and Wednesday. They failed to register a kill either day but enjoyed two hot chases. Dogs were well trained, but veteran hunters among the outfit declared luck was simply against them both days.

Members of the Hargrove Bear Hunting Club, of Canton, swung into action in the Sherwood area Monday and Tuesday with a dozen A-1 bear dogs.

Dr. J. L. Reeves is president of the Hargrove Club.

Members of the Hargrove Club under the experienced supervision of J. A. (Uncle Joe) Hargrove, veteran bear hunter of the Western Carolina mountains, who has witnessed the killing of more than 25 bear during the past half century he has been following this annual pastime. Uncle Joe has hunted in virtually every nook and corner of the mountains in this area and is considered an expert on the habits of the clever brute.

Taking to the mountains late Sunday afternoon, members of the Hargrove Club camped in two locations in the Sunburst area. One group occupied the John-Re-Cline camp, while others nestled over night in the Robinson-Patterson camp, two miles nearer the heart of the rugged Sunburst hunting area.
