### U. S. RESTORES TO BRITAIN COPY OF MAGNA CARTA

WASHINGTON — One of four copies of the 730-year-old Magna Carta, held for safekeeping during the war by the United States Library of Congress, was returned to Great Britain recently. The document was signed by King John of England in 1215 as a voluntary relinquishment of most of his powers.

Brought to the United States in 1939 for the New York World's Fair and kept here when the war started, the Lincoln Cathedral copy of the manuscript was handed back to British Minister John Balfour recently by Dr. Luther H. Evans, Librarian of Congress.

Accepting the document, Mr. Balfour commented that the great charter was the forerunner of both the American and British bill of rights, the British habeas corpus act and the American Declaration of Independence.

The charter, set between two pieces of armor plateglass, will return to England in a zinc-lined box.
