Haywood Women Win In Victory Garden Contest

Mrs. Frank Williams, of Lake Junaluska, was the adult winner in North Carolina of the Green Thumb contest, sponsored throughout the country by the National Victory Garden Institute of New York, according to John H. Harris, horticulturist of State College, Raleigh. She has received a handsome silver plaque with the name of the donors on one side and her name and the date on the other.

"I had three sons in the service and I thought it would be the finest way I could spend my time, when I was so worried. It gave me something to do that took my mind off of my anxiety and I felt that I was doing something for my country at home when I produced all the food I could," said Mrs. Williams.

"I have always liked to garden and when I read about the contest in the Reader's Digest I decided to make a special garden and enter," she explained. "I planted 23 varieties of vegetables in my fourth of an acre garden, and with the exception of two hours work by my daughter, I did all the work myself," she said.

Mrs. Williams had about one-third of the garden in early vegetables, those which she could grow in two crops. She replanted as soon as one crop matured. From the garden she supplied her table with fresh vegetables in season and has stored and canned enough to do her during the entire winter.

Here is the list of vegetables she grew in her prize winning Green Thumb garden: Spinach, Mustard, Kale, Onions, Lettuce, head and leaf, Peas, Carrots, Beets, Beans, soy, running, bunch, and butter, Okra, Tomatoes, Corn, Turnips, Rutabagers, Sugar, Pumpkin, regular pie pumpkin, Broccoli, Sweet Potatoes, Irish Potatoes, Celery, Cabbage, early and late, Squash, Swiss Chard, Cucumbers, Strong Peppers and Sweet Peppers. Mrs. Williams has been a member of one of the Haywood Home Demonstration clubs for the past eight years, and at present she is a member of the Lake Junaluska club. She has won recognition in
