
RIOTS IN INDIA

BOMBAY, India-Two persons were killed and more than 300 injured in all-day rioting this week, and sporadic disorders continued in Bombay's native section.

The rioting began with a pitched battle between police and marching supporters of Subhas Chandra Bose, former leader of the Japanese - sponsored India National Army. Law enforcement officials described the disorders as anti-British and anti-police.
