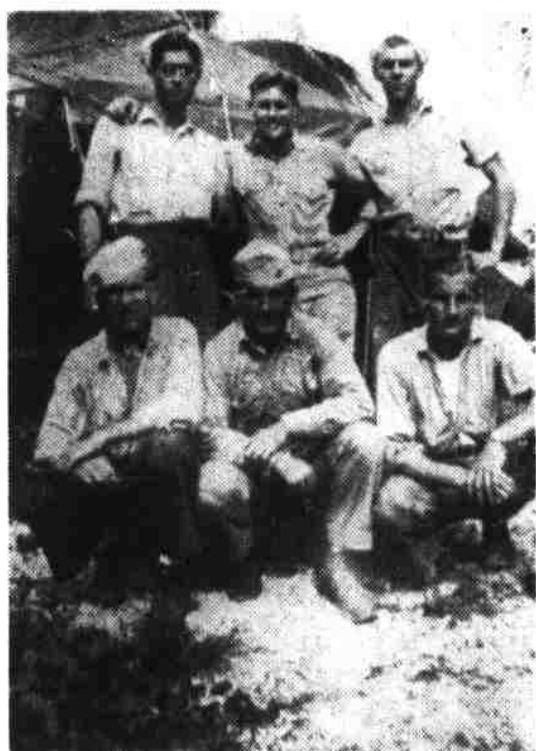

Miss Mary Quinlan Serving With The Red Cross Relief

Miss Mary E. Quinlan, daughter of Mrs. Charles E. Quinlan, of Waynesville, is now serving as an American civilian relief field representative in Western Europe, according to information received by The Mountaineer from the Red Cross headquarters.

Miss Quinlan is one of a group of more than one hundred relief workers who are participating in the American Red Cross relief program to fifteen war-devastated countries this winter. They are supervising the distribution of more than ten million chapter-produced garments in addition to large quantities of hospital and medical supplies in these countries. A supplementary emergency, milk feeding program for children is also being conducted in many areas under the supervision of American Red Cross workers.

Prior to her overseas Red Cross appointment in Sept., 1944, Miss Quinlan served the Red Cross in the Rapides Parish Chapter, Alexandria, La., and Norfolk, Va. She is a graduate of Peace Junior College, attended Agnes Scott College, University of North Carolina and the summer branch of Duke University summer school at Lake Junaluska.
