

When cooking macaron!, spaghetti or noodles, put two to three quarts of boiling water and one tablespoon salt into a four-quart size pan. This is for four ounces of the macaroni, spaghetti or noodles. With water at bubbling point, gradually add the spaghetti so as to keep water actively boiling. Leave pan uncovered. If the macaroni or spaghetti or noodles tend to stick to the bottom of the pan, loosen them gently with a wooden spoon or a spatula after they have cooked about three minutes.
