
Army Dropped Covering News in Austria May 1



Reach High Record In March

A total of 74 persons was killed and 521 others injured in automobile traffic accidents in North Carolina last month, T. Boddie Ward, commissioner of motor vehicles, reported Tuesday.

Ward said this was an increase of 37 per cent over March, 1945, when 54 were killed and 301 injured

Guilford county, with seven deaths, had the highest fatality record of the month.

During March, the State Highway Patrol investigated 480 accidents in which 52 persons were killed and 325 injured. Patrolmen arrested 4,031 persons and issued 4,372 citations. They charged 423 persons with drunken driving.

As a result of the patrol activi ties, the State collected \$27,081.37 in revenue, county school funds received \$57,179.82 in fines and county general funds received \$35,-651,13 in court costs.

The patrolmen recovered stolen automobiles valued at \$53,110.
