Excess Burley Set At 16 Cents

The rate of penalty for marketing excess Burley tobacco on the 1946-47 crop year will be 16 cents per pound, according to official figures issued by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, it has been announced this week by R. C. Francis, chairman of the Haywood county AAA committee.

The effective date on this increase in penalty is July 1 of this year and any excess Burley tobacco from the 1945 crop sold after June 30, 1946, will be subject to the increased penalty rate, it was pointed out by Mr. Francis,


