Almarie Robinson Becomes Bride Of Dallas Rhea Clark

The marriage of Miss Almarie Robinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Thomas Robinson of Waynesville, to Dallas Rhea Clark, chief machinist, U. S. Navy, son of Mrs. Nellie Clark and the late Dee Clark, also of Waynesville, was solemnized here in the Presbyterian church at five o'clock on Friday afternoon, with the pastor, the Rev. Malcolm B. Williamson, pronouncing the vows.

For the occasion the altar of the church was arranged in evergreen as a background with large floor vases containing arrangements of mixed white flowers. At intervals were placed candelabra bearing lighted cathedral candles which were entertained with ivy.

Prior to the ceremony a program of nuptial music was given by Miss Ida Lou Gibson, soloist, and Mrs. L. M. Richeson, organist. Miss Gibson sang "Ave Maria" and "Oh, Perfect Love." Mrs. Richeson played "I Love You Truly" and "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life," and "Intermezzo." For the processionals and the recessional the traditional wedding marches were used.

The couple entered the church together. The bride wore a suit of grey gabardine with navy accessories and her corsage was of red roses.

Serving as ushers were Wallace Robinson, brother of the bride, and Robert Hugh Clark, brother of the bridegroom.

The bride is a graduate of the Waynesville Township high school and of St. John's Business school. She holds a position with the local office of the U. S. Reemployment Service.

The bridegroom entered the navy in 1931 and was Haywood county's first reported war casualty. He was serving aboard the USS Houston at the time it was sunk on March 1, 1942, and was shortly after taken a prisoner by the Japs by whom he was held until the close of the war, a period of over three years. He has been spending a 60-day leave here with his mother, after which he will report for his next assignment in the navy.

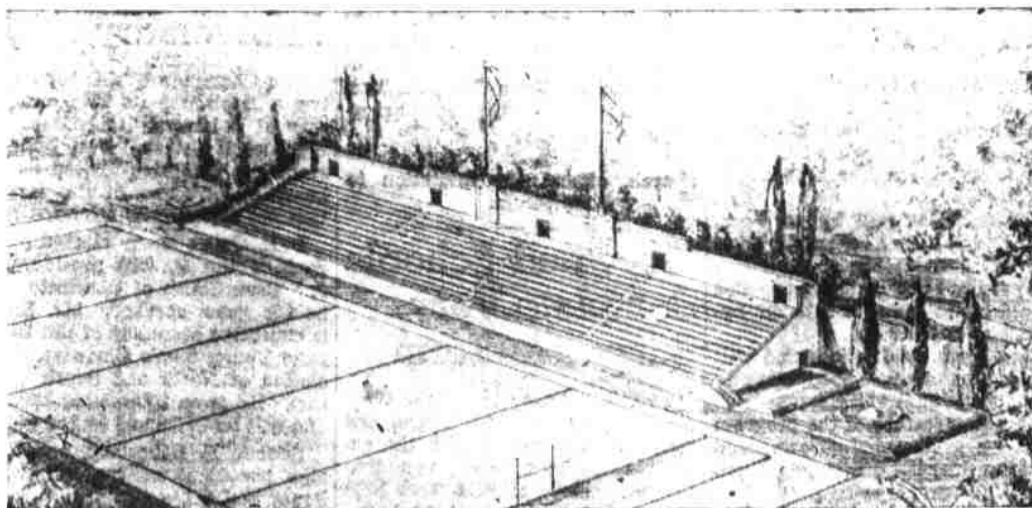
Following the ceremony the couple left for a wedding trip to an unannounced destination.
