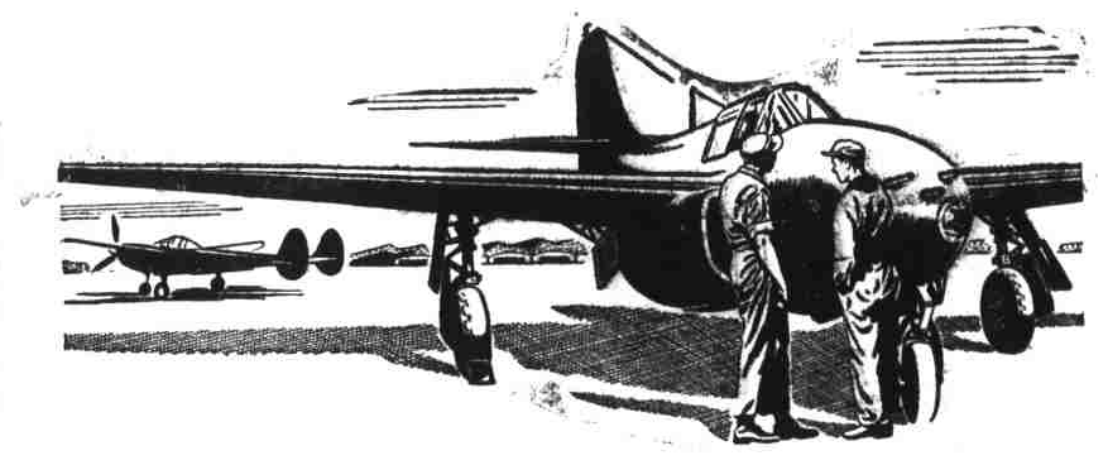

Deer Hunting Next Season Will Be Closed

John D. Findlay, commissioner of game and inland fisheries, said that western counties of the state would be closed to deer hunting next season while deer trapping and redistribution are expected.

His decision was endorsed by the state board of conservation and development.

Since Piedmont counties have been closed to deer hunting for the last several years, this action indicates there will be no deer hunting next year in and west of a line composed of Warren, Nash, Edgecombe, Wilson, Greene, Wayne, Johnston, Wake, Chatham, Randolph, Montgomery, Richmond and Scotland counties.

Findlay's program does not contemplate moving deer from Western to Eastern North Carolina, he said. The overall program is set

to cover five years, but that does not mean any particular area will be closed to deer hunters all that time.
