Big Navy Advocates Scowl At Ship Cuts

WASHINGTON—Big Navy advocates in the House scowled at an Appropriations Committee decision to trim 114 fighting ships from the proposed postwar fleet.

They pointed to Navy figures showing that the \$4,639,569,000 recommended by the Committee would approve for the operation of 965 combatant vessels compared with the 1,079 which the House voted unanimously late last year as its suggestion.

The Navy's original request for \$6,325,000,000, which the Budget Bureau trimmed to \$4,224,000,000, was designed to provide and back up the 1,079 figure.

Representative Carl Vinson (D) of Georgia, Chairman of the Naval Affairs Committee and Representative Sterling Cole of New York, top Republican member, told reporters they had not decided what to do about the Appropriations Committee action.

There were indications that either Mr. Vinson—who wrote last year's postwar fleet bill—or other Naval Affairs Committee members would seek to restore at least part of the Navy's original request when the House starts debate tomorrow.
