Bankers See Loan To Britain Benefit To United States

WASHINGTON—A resolution of the American Bankers Association supporting the proposed \$3,750,000,000 British loan as "in the interest of the United States" was presented last week to the House Banking Committee.

"We are of the opinion," the resolution said, "that the loan agreement will provide at a critical and unique point working capital essential to the world's economic well-being that it will assist in the removal of international trade barriers, and that in so doing it will promote world economic recovery and contribute materially to future world peace."
