Anthallan New Drug For Hay Fever Victims

NEW YORK—Dr. Alexander D.
Ghiselin, Jr., of Presbyterian hospi-
tal reports that a new drug—
anthallan—"When used in doses
of three to 12 capsules daily" over
a period of one to five weeks offers
hope to millions of American hay-
fever sufferers.

Writing in the June issue of The
Bulletin of the New York Academy
of Medicine, Dr. Ghiselin says
tests and clinical studies conducted
in 42 cases at the Columbia univer-
sity Presbyterian hospital medical
center indicated anthallan was "a
useful drug for obtaining relief in
a high percentage of cases of seas-
onal and non-seasonal rhinitis."

And, adds the doctor, "anthallan
can be used with complete safety."
Discussing the results obtained
in the tests in which "only four
cases were failures," he writes:

"No patient was allowed to
change any factors such as his
surroundings, diet, or activities
which might conceivably affect the
severity of the nasal symptoms.
Therefore, any remission of these
symptoms during anthallan therapy
can be attributed only to the in-
fluence of this drug.

Here are some of the results Dr.
Ghiselin reports:
There are no injections nor pre-
liminary tests required.
