'46 Wheat Crop Larger In State With Less Acres

N. C. Oat Crop Also Predicted To Be An Increase Over 1945

RALEIGH-Production of wheat in North Carolina for the year 1946 is estimated at 6,384,000 bushels or an increase of three per cent over last year's production, the Federal-State Crop Reporting service says in its June crop re

Based upon reports from farmers located in all areas of the state, the estimate reported that wheat prospects have improved considerably over a month ago. The yield per acre is now indicated at 16 bushels, compared to 14 bushels harvested in 1945 and 13.3 bushels for the 10-year (1935-1944) average period.

Agricultural Statistician Frank Parker said that "due to unfavor able weather and the labor situa tion, tarmers were unable to sow as much wheat last fall as they intended to sow. Consequently, the acreage is down to 399,000 or nine per cent less than in 1945."

Production of wheat in the United States this year is expected to total 775,000,000 bushels, or six per cent less than last year This production, however, is still the third largest on record. Prospects improved during the month of May, adding 32,000,000 bushels to the total expected for the 1946

North Carolina's oat crop is es finated at 9,900,000 bushels, eight per cent more than was harvested last year. If this indicated production is realized, the oat crop will be the large t on record for North Carolina.

This attempt is looked upon as a test case by the Indians of New Mexico, especially the Navahos who say they are keeping close watch over the number of refusals. time, place, and names of refusing county clerks. When enough data are accumulated it will be submitted to the United States Attorney General and the Department of Indian Affairs for a ruling,

World Air Lines Plan Lower Rates

NEW YORK-Ten trans-Atlantic air lines proposed recently to reduce the fare between New York and London by \$50 and between New York and Paris by \$30.

John E. Stater, chairman of the North Atlantic Traffic Conference of the International Air Transport Association, announced the proposed rates, effective June 25, if approved first by the Civil Aeronautics Board and the foreign governments involved.

The rate proposal would cut the cost to London to \$325 and to Paris \$345. Both are now \$375.


