ELLENSBURG, Wash. A 47-year-old former Montana cowpuncher, Larry Hightower, was striding along at four miles an hour last week on the first leg of a wheelbarrow-pushing jaunt around the world in 12 years.

Wearing a red flasher on his coat tails to warn night drivers, Mr. Hightower started Thursday over the Cascade Mountains toward Seattle, steering a 55-pound, white wheelbarrow containing a radio receiving set and personal belongings.

His 20,000-mile itinerary goes from Seattle, Wash., to San Francisco, where he'll board a boat for Hawaii. He plans to island hop to the Asiatic mainland and push along to Portugal to take a ship to New York.

And from New York?

"I'll keep pushing this wheelbarrow till I set it down right smack in the heart of Ellensburg," Mr. Hightower promised.

is fire.

Shall we call down fire from heaven and Jesus simply answered—The son of man is not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them.

Fire has been a great blessing to mankind. Rightly used it is man's salvation. With fire man cooks his food, warms his home, produces power for his factories. The capture on the mountainside and the open fire in the humble cottage have their place in the life of a people who long for companionship and enjoy the peace and quiet of home.

But while these things are so fire is about the most destructive force we know. The most deadly weapons of war are made so by the use of fire. It matters not whether it is a spit-fire in the air, a flame thrower on the ground or a torpedo fired from a submarine, the thing that kills is fire. The thing which one day will consume this earth will not be wind or flood but fire. With the coming of the atomic bomb we are well on our way to complete destruction by fire. I walked one day thru the streets of old Pompey where in the year 79 A. D. angry Vesuvius belched forth its fire and brimstone and buried alive that old city, but even Vesuvius in her angriest mood is but a tiny candle compared to the destructive force of the atomic bomb.

We are certainly living today on the crater of an active volcano from which there is no escape unless the will of man is brought into subjection to the will of God.

## Furlough Pay Bill Gets Approval By President

Terminal pay for furlough time not taken while in the service has been agreed upon in a compromise plan that President Truman has approved. The method of payment, as recommended by the budget bureau, was for veterans to receive cash for all payments of less than \$50, and five-year bonds in \$25 denominations for all greater amounts.

About 14,000,000 men would be eligible for payments at the rate of 2½ days a month, less time off for passes and furlough, for their time in the service, at the rate of pay on their rank at time of discharge. The program is expected to cost around \$3 billion. Final passage is yet to come in Congress, which has awaited the budget bureau's suggestions on the method of making payment before writing the measure into law.

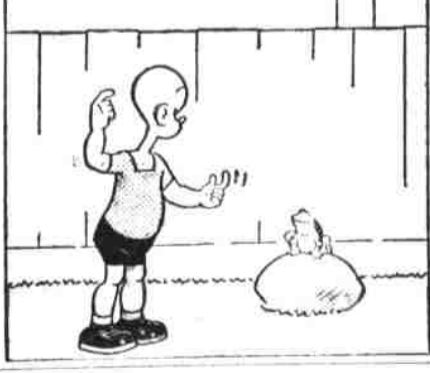

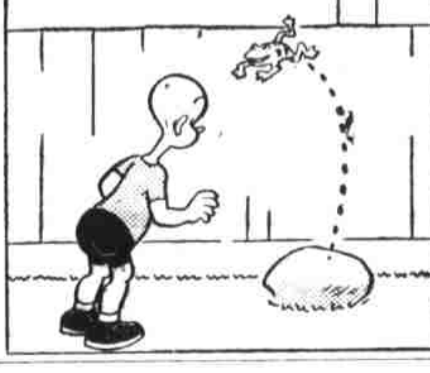

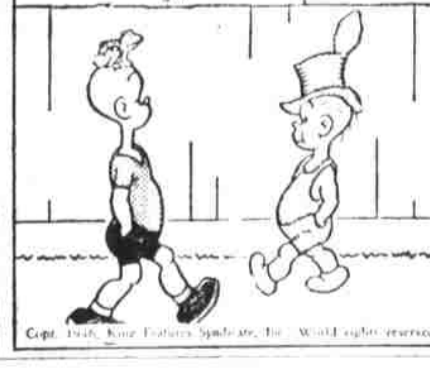
