

#### **Farm Questions** and Answers

QUESTION: Should I self my ivestock in view of the critical feed\_outlook?

ANSWER All indications are that livestock and their products will bring very good prices for sometime. Even with high prices farmers can't make a profit unless they grow most of their own feed Extension specialists say keep your animals, if you can furnish the bulk of their feed from pasture and home grown grains, but don't try


