

Waynesville Summer Players To Present "Ghosts" Tonight

Featuring their third week of dramatic stock, the Waynesville Summer Players will present Henrik Ibsen's immortal drama, "Ghosts," opening tonight, Tuesday, July 30.

Civic Repertory Theatre. Madame Alla Nazimova, world renowned Russian actress has appeared hundreds of times in the role of Mrs. Alving and well-known actors too numerous to mention have been seen in the exacting role of Oswald.

"Ghosts" is considered to be Ibsen's greatest play and has been produced probably more times than any play ever written.

Jack R. Pyle will play the part of Oswald, the dissolute young son of Mrs. Alving, home from Paris on a holiday with his head full of peculiar ideas which develop into one of the greatest climaxes in theatrical writing.

Louise Gagnon, also of stage and radio, will be seen in an entirely new characterization as Mrs. Alving. She appeared here also in "Claudia" and in "Ladies In Retirement".

The role of Pastor Manders, hypochondriac friend of the Alving household falls to Taylor Reese, making his first appearance here this season.

Vacation Bible Schools Concluded At Crabtree

Two Vacation Bible schools recently were completed in the Crabtree section. At the James Chapel Baptist church, of which the Rev. Howard Mann of Canton, is pastor, there were four teachers to instruct the 41 students enrolled.

Forty-three enrolled at the Rock Spring Baptist church and daily attendance averaged 37. There were five teachers who assisted in the teaching.

Three Veterans Register Here For Schooling

Although there is expected to be a fairly large enrollment of veterans in high school this autumn, only three persons—all veterans—registered with the Waynesville district superintendent, Jack Messer, for freshman-year college training who had been unable to gain entrance in a regular institution.

This indicates that most persons with sufficient credits for college training are being absorbed by universities and colleges in the normal manner. Reports from other sections of the state also have shown a generally low enrollment for the special "on campus" and "off campus" courses, although there were more than 100 in Asheville which apparently assures an "off campus" course here.

Of the three registrants here, one requested campus training at Asheville-Biltmore, one preferred "off campus" schooling at Asheville, and one requested training in Waynesville.

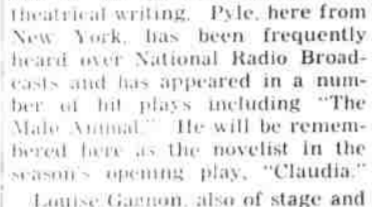
