British School Teacher Exchange Resumed

LONDON, Twenty British school-teachers will leave this month for the Province of Ontario, Canada, under the first exchange scheme since the end of the war. Others are expected to leave for South Africa and Australia later this year. The system of interchange of teachers between the Dominions was instituted in 1919 and kept up annually until the last group of teachers from Canada and Australia arrived in Britain just before the outbreak of war and remained here until the end of it.
