## Vet Housing Progress Is Reported By Wyatt of FHA

WASHINGTON—Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt reported that former service men actually are getting between 85 and 95 per cent of veterans' homes built so far, but warned that the housing shortage will get worse instead of better this winter.

There have been reports recently that discharged service men were not getting all the homes supposedly being built for veterans.

But Wyatt told a news conference that a recent check showed the veterans were not being frozen out of homes. What is more, he added, they are getting good homes. A preliminary survey by the Federal Housing Administration showed that only a small fraction of GI homes are Jerry-built.

Wyatt said he still is confident of success for his program, which envisions 2,700,000 homes for veterans even though the task has proved "tough as hell."

He said 387,100 homes of all kinds have been completed so far this year. He hopes thousands more will be ready this fall.

But in a monthly report, he pointed out:

"Constantly rising demand at present more than offsets the additional accommodations, and not until after the turn of the year will the demand begin to level off."

Wyatt said he would support a reported recommendation by Sen. James M. Mead, (D., N. Y.), that President Truman call a special session of Congress to act on the Wagner - Ellender - Taft loan-range housing bill.

Wyatt also said price tags on new GI houses are too high for the average veteran.

Meanwhile W. A. Bryant, chief of the Civilian Production Administration's consumer durable goods division, said a veteran who succeeds in buying one of Watt's houses may have trouble furnishing it.

Bryant said hardwood production has doubled, a fact now showing up at furniture factories. But demand is two to three times greater than 1941.

"Prospects are that all-wood furniture will be short for another year or two," Bryant said in an interview. He said upholstered furniture is in somewhat better supply.

Wyatt reported that 61,300 homes more fortunate hands to share what they now waste while helping other children.

"One partly worn basketball almost ready to be discarded by an American high school can be repaired by a Polish coach and made to serve two or three years longer," he said, "and it may be the only piece of play equipment the school has."

Aid to teachers in the form of money for rest, travel and professional study, and to students for scholarship, was also recommended. All such aid, it was suggested, should be channeled through UNESCO.

The conference further urged its members to strengthen the hands of UNESCO through more active support on the part of their teachers' associations "back home" and passed as resolutions statements of policy that "active members of the teaching profession" should be included in all national delegations to UNESCO and on all UNESCO committees. UNESCO's projected program of teacher and student exchange, of efforts to stamp out illiteracy in every country throughout the world, and to help lift the standards of education, as described to the Conference by Dr. Howard Wilson, Deputy Executive Director of UNESCO's Preparatory Commission, were voted enthusiastic support by the delegates.

## World Teacher Conference Urges Aid To War Areas

ENDICOTT, N. Y.—A plan for channeling aid in money and equipment from teachers and schools of all parts of the world to the teachers and schools of war-devastated areas, has been worked out here by the World Conference of the Teaching Profession, representing teachers' associations of 30 nations.

The plan involves the formation of a committee in each country, to be appointed by the teachers associations of the country, and is part of a comprehensive international program of action growing out of the two weeks of study and discussion carried on by the delegates involved here by the National Education Association.

**Pass Recommendations**

Recommendations to United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization were also passed by the conference in its final sessions, as were recommendations to the Preparatory Commission of the New World Organization of teachers which was set up at the conference earlier in the week.

With the needs of both teachers and schools recently presented by several teacher-delegates from such war-torn lands as China, Poland, the Netherlands, and Norway, teacher-delegates who in many cases had served dangerously in aid to schools in war-devastated areas worked long and hard. W. De Latta of the Netherlands, serving as chairman, to offer the conference for its consideration recommendations that were both emotionally satisfying and thoroughly practical.

The recommendations as passed, listed as the special ways in which teachers could help through their professional organizations the following:

1. To urge their governments to give all possible aid through international cooperation.
2. To contribute directly in money and materials.
3. To cooperate in the collection, allocation and distribution of assistance.

The teachers were urged to get their pupils to collect such items as clothing, shoes, paper, pencils, toys and physical education equipment. In discussing the need of this in one of the committee's meetings between Conference sessions, Antoni Wojcicki of the Polish Teachers Union stressed the possibility of helping children of
