

Warning Given To Boys Under 16 Shooting Rifles

Boys under 16 years of age, who are underage to legally carry fire-arms, are issued a warning not to shoot rifles and endanger persons and livestock within range of their weapons.

Rufus Ratcliff, game warden for Haywood county, reports that he has been told of several occasions where persons came near to being hit by missiles fired carelessly by young boys out "target practicing." Last week on the farm of Shufford Howell, near Waynesville, a cow was killed in such a manner, and

two cows from the place of W. E. Trammell, of Waynesville, Rt. 1, were lost in the past two years under the same circumstances.

Boys under 16, explains Warden Ratcliff, do not usually have mature enough judgment to know how to handle fire-arms carefully. They do not realize how far a distance their .22 calibre shells are going.

Parents are reminded that it is dangerous for their boys under 16 to use rifles, and are asked to cooperate with authorities by preventing this unauthorized use.

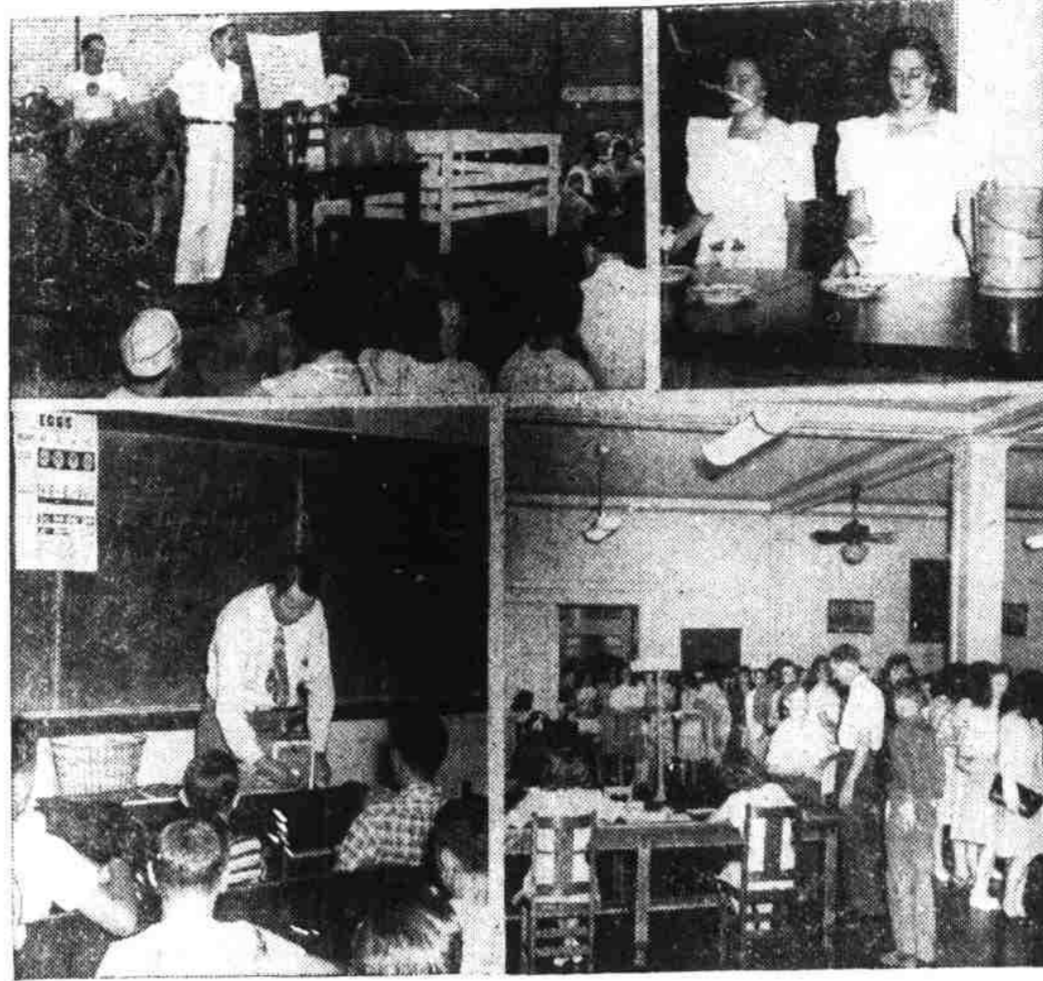
The Intermediate group gave the general assembly program on Sunday night with special music by Ransler Phillips and Donald Grooms finishing out the program.
