In a special women's event for the largest fish caught by a woman contestant in the open week, Mrs. C. M. Park of Wilmington took the honors, with a 16-inch, 22-ounce bluefish.

man who is a resident of North Carolina is not required to buy a license; second, anyone in service who is not a resident of North Carolina is entitled to buy a resident license, which comes cheaper than the non-resident variety.

There's one point to keep in mind in connection with these provisions, however. Servicemen still must purchase any special permit that any particular area requires for hunting or fishing. And also they must have the Federal duck stamp to hunt waterfowl.

TERMINAL LEAVE—Another point which comes up is the status of a serviceman who is on terminal leave. Legally of course, servicemen on terminal leave still are considered on active duty, and consequently can take advantage of the special provisions on fees. They are required, however, as are servicemen on active duty, to carry papers proving their right to the exceptions in license regulations. So, whatever classification you are in, on active duty or on terminal leave—remember to carry along proper identification. You'll save time and trouble for yourself and for fish and game protectors.

NOW GOING ON—Squirrel shooting in and west of Alleghany, Wilkes, Caldwell, Burke and Ruthford counties began September 15 and continues through December 15. In this area, the daily bag limit will be six. A new exception this year will allow inclusion of two fox squirrels in the daily bag limit after a lapse of several years to bring about restoration of the bag fellows to numbers sufficient to permit their being taken.

FOR SERVICEMEN—Because of occasional misunderstandings about the status of servicemen under North Carolina regulations on hunting and fishing licenses, it might be a good idea for sportsmen in service who are thinking of going into the field to take a look at this.
