Mountaineers Score Twice Each Quarter Against Sylva

80 Yard Run By Powers Features Offense As Locals Take Second Win

Hunters Out In Increased Numbers For Squirrels

Shell Shortage And Leaves On Trees Protect Game So Far

Notice to the Squirrels of Haywood County. Look Out! Nearly four times as many hunters are licensed this year as there were at the same time in 1941. Members of the nut-gathering club can expect a lot of pellet dodging in the next few months.

The squirrels now have two things to protect them. Leaves on the trees, just beginning to turn, are so thick that hunters can barely get a glimpse on squirrels before they can be off out of sight. And the shell shortage is another thing the fur wearers can be thankful for in their prayers.

Because of this, rumors Game Warden Rufus Ratliff, few hunters are bringing in more than two squirrels from their days in the woods. With shotgun pellets so difficult to get, hunters are waiting until one of getting a hit before blasting away, although reports from most areas in the county are of more game than ever before.

Warden Ratliff reports that in the past 15 days there were 527 licenses sold, which added to 70 sold prior to that time, makes a total of 597 permits available to hunt in Haywood county. Figures from 1945 show that by the middle of September there had been nearly 100 license sales. Of this year's total, 219 are com-
