They buy a den on an average of every two weeks because of the high mor tality of snakes in such work. A few showmen use poisonous snakes, Allen says, but not many.

The next biggest market takes in zoos and museums. Then, Allen says, there are some 5,000 individual collectors of reptiles who have private zoos in their homes and they are always in the mar-
