Millions of British Swear Off Smoking
LONDON (AP)—Britons in the millions swore off smoking on April 16, and made the rounds of the tobacco shops for a final routine binge before new higher-tar history prices went into effect.

Beginning the 17th, the package of 20 cigarettes will cost three shillings four pence (about 60 cents), a one shilling (20 cents) increase in 48 hours.

"Nine out of 10 of my customers say they will stop smoking at midnight tonight," said a Fleet Street tobacconist who sold his day's stock of cigarettes before 11 a.m.

"Not one in a thousand will really stop," his wife predicted.

"They say they will but wait till the old craving comes upon them. I hope you don't swear off," she told her husband. "You've had temperamental enough now."

Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton who caused the price hike by raising the duty on imported tobacco in order to cut dollar spending was scolded by such diverse newspapers as the sedate Manchester Guardian and the Communist Daily Worker.

The Everyday Counselor

Profanity is not an indication of forcefulness of speech, but of a lack of vocabulary. Its use formerly confined largely to men, is growing among women and young people.

It compares with the use of "imnerd words"—words which, according to Webster's dictionary refer to the deity. For instance, the common word "damn" is defined by Webster as "a form of Jesus, used in minced oaths." There are two other common words and their definitions are these: "Golly," a euphemism of God, used in minced oaths; gosh, a substitute for God, used in minced oaths.

"Damn, darned, darnation" are said to be colloquial euphemisms for damn, damned, damnation. Those who use such words would be shocked if they realized the real meaning of the words.

If we try to excuse ourselves by saying that these exclamations slip through our lips, we should read the Epistle of James: "If any man thinketh himself to be religious, while he bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his heart, this man's religion is vain." Jesus Christ warned against careless use of speech when he wrote, "Let your speech be: Yea, yea; Nay, nay." Whatsoever is more than this is of the evil one." Unfortunately we find many people, who profess the name of God in Christ, indulging in various forms of profanity, including these "minced oaths."

Profanity is vulgarity. It reflects hearts and minds which need to be cleaned up. Other people judge us by our speech and our actions more than by our professions. Profanity, furthermore, indicates poverty of vocabulary, a limited knowledge of the English language. Dirty speech reflects a dirty mind and heart. All that it goes carelessly speech, which is more harmful to the speaker than to the one spoken against.

Writing of this, the Apostle James said: "The tongue is a little member and boasteth great things. The tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity; so is the tongue among our members; that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the

Sunday School Lesson
National Glory and Decay
HIGHLIGHTS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(The International Uniform Lesson on the above topic for April 27 is II Samuel 5: 9; I Kings 1-11, the Memory Verse being Ephesians 4:32, "Be ye kind one to another.")

"NOW DAVID was old and stricken in years," the first book of Kings begins. Most of the events in King David's life are recorded in first and second Samuel. Now he is about to die and a new chapter to be written in the history of the Jewish people—a story of Israel in its greatest glory.

Before we begin this new chapter in Jewish history, however, we must mention one episode in the life of King David. David made inquiries about survivors of his friend Jonathan, Saul's son and his dear friend. Ziba, a servant of Saul, told him of one son who had been but five years old when his father was killed, and David sent for him. His name was Mephibosheth, and he was "lame on his feet."

He was brought to the king who gave him back Saul's family lands, and told Ziba that he should manage them for Mephibosheth, and receive in return a part of the proceeds. He also told Mephibosheth that he should eat always at the king's table.

Solomon, whom David had named to succeed him, was not the oldest son, so Adonijah, his older brother, decided he would be the next ruler. He consulted with Joab and Abiathar, the priest, and they helped him. David knew nothing of this until Nathan, the prophet, came to Bethsheba, Solomon's mother, and told her to go to David and inform him, and ask that her son, Solomon, should at once be proclaimed king to displace Adonijah.

Bathsheba went to the king and reminded him that he had sworn that Solomon should be king in his place, as the Lord wished. David called in Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet, and told them to take Solomon, place him on the king's own mule and take him to Gihon, and there anoint him king of Israel and Judah.

Solomon Anointed
It was done as David directed and the people accepted Solomon as their king, crying, "God save Solomon!" And they rejoiced greatly. There was nothing for Adonijah to do but submit, but eventually he was killed at the command of Solomon and also others who had joined him.
