More than 150 delegates from 29 Western North Carolina counties attended the all-day meeting of the Western North Carolina Public Health Association at Lake Lure May 23, hearing addresses by leaders in the fields of public health services.

Dr. Ernest Branch, director of the division of oral hygiene, state board of health, Raleigh, spoke at the morning general session. Dr. H. C. Whims, Buncombe county health officer and president of the association, presided.

Canton Guernseys Complete Records For Publication

PETERBOROUGH, N. H.—Two registered Guernsey cows of Canton, North Carolina, have completed official Advanced Register records that were supervised by the North Carolina State College and reported to The American Guernsey Cattle Club for approval and publication.

Starting their records as junior two-year olds on three times daily milking for a ten-month period, Haywood Gluck, owned by Florence Osborne, produced 9436 pounds of milk and 476 pounds of butterfat and Frankalene of Garden Creek, owned by H. Arthur Osborne, produced 9114 pounds of milk and 448 pounds of butterfat.

Gluck is a daughter of the outstanding Guernsey sire Majesty of Garden Creek, owned by Mr. Osborne, that has sixteen daughters in the Performance Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club, and Frankalene is the third daughter of the registered Guernsey sire Haywood Blitz, that is owned by Florence Osborne.
