Agreement Effective August 28th With AFL Raises Pay Of 325 Employees R. L. Prevost, Sr., president of Manager New Unagusta Manufacturing company, Store

and C. F. Bradley of Asheville, regional representative of the A. F. of L. Upholsterers International Union, have released a joint statement of the terms of a negotiated mid-contract wage settlement which will add some \$98,000 annually to the Unagusta payroll.

The wage settlement involves a basic 10 cents per hour increase plus additional adjustments in 38 wage classifications of from one to five cents an hour; which will add from \$5.50 to \$6.25 per week to the take-home pay of some 325 furniture operatives in the two Hazelwood plants

Two paid holidays also were added


The new settlement goes in effect August 28th under a two-year firm agreement which runs from March 12, 1947 until 1949. It provides for periodic wage reopenings of which the present negotiation is the first since the two-year agreement was signed in March

Weekly take-home pay under the new wage rates will increase from the present average of \$39.20 to between \$44 and \$45-one of the highest wage rates not only in North Carolina but in the furniture industry of the nation according to union representative Bradley; although he pointed out that the Unagusta firm produces only a special high grade type of bedroom and

dining room furniture. One of the outstanding features of the wage agreement is a special provision for the creation of a joint management-labor committee in the plant whose aim shall be to increase production to meet the increased wage bill without any increase in price to consumers on the products.
