... For the next 20 years, Patrick labored the island and at the time of his death he had established 700 churches, ordained 3,000 priests and consecrated 330 bishops. Even with that phenomenal achievement, Patrick died in a land not completely converted. There still was much work left for Ireland's next most famous saints, Bridget and Columba.

... Columba, also known to the Irish as Columkille—dove of the church—came on the scene 100 years after Patrick. During his lifetime, much of it in exile at Iona, Columba considered himself Patrick's lieutenant. An intriguing legend has come down concerning Columkille and the last day of the world:

In a dream, Columkille was transported to the last day of the world. Accompanying Patrick from heaven, Columkille watched in awe as the bodies of men were resurrected from their graves and united with their souls. When all had been accomplished, Patrick, in a great voice, called on all the Irish to assemble in one place.

Calling Columkille, then, Patrick sent his lieutenant to heaven with instructions to have St. Peter prepare a suitable welcome for the Irish.

"St. Peter saw no objection to such a reception," said Columkille, "but he enjoined me to return to Patrick with an order that only the good Irish could enter—the others to go below."

Patrick was taken aback. With great anger, he told Columkille to return to the gates and inform Peter that heaven would get all the Irish or none at all.

When asked what happened next, Columkille said his dream ended at that point.

Inland Sailor Plans Ocean Voyage As Start On His College Education

JACKSON, Mich. (UP)—An ocean-going vessel is sitting hundreds of miles from navigable water here, but it's all part of Theodore Conover's plan to go to college.

The young ex-sailor plans to sail his converted whale boat down the Ohio River to the Mississippi, thence via the Gulf of Mexico to Tampa, Fla., and his goal, the University of Tampa.

A year ago the bogey of expenses thwarted Conover's idea of attending the southern college. There was the problem of transportation as well as housing.

So Conover got a 28-foot ex-Navy whale boat at an auction for \$130. Since then he has converted it into a sleek-power-driven cabin craft.

Interested tow-people pitched in to help the disabled veteran in his task. The city water superintendent, D. J. Stellingworth, contributed a discarded impeller wheel from one of the city's deep well water pumps for a propeller.

Conover built a 14-foot cabin containing seats, bunk, table, closet and kitchenette. He installed a new marine engine and a 34-foot mast for sail power. Thirty-seven feet of railroad rail provides a heavy keel.

Maryland City Still Pays Off Its Civil War Ransom

FREDERICK, Md. (AP)—The tops of this city's Civil War ransom bonds are now being paid off. The Civil War bonds, which were sold to the city in 1864, will have finally been paid in full. The city has been paying off the bonds since 1917, when the Civil War will end for Frederick.

Frederick has a population of 18,000. It was the only city in the South to be burned by Confederates in 1862. The money was donated by the local Jubal A. Early army. It required a few Union troops to get the money.

Five bonds per cent had been paid and the city asked for a delay in 1930. They've been paying off the bonds since then, but the practice of law, on March 1, 1938, Mr. Campbell continued to pay the bonds, made it necessary for the city to close its office on August 20, 1947. Originally, the money was to be repaid through sinking fund notes. This required the city to set aside annually a certain amount and to pay the bonds at 100% maturity dates.

Frederick found it difficult to hold on to the sinking fund notes, and subsequently a new financial arrangement was made to complete every year.

Then in 1917 the city had a financial house-keeping. It grouped a lot of its debt together and included them in a new batch of bonds. A portion of the Civil War

debt remaining was included. How much it was no one knows now. City register A. A. Nicodemus guesses between \$40,000 and \$50,000. He also estimates the city has paid \$300,000 in interest—\$100,000 more than the original debt.

At any rate, the whole 1917 issue will be paid off in 1951, when the Civil War will end for Frederick.
