Prevent Food Molds Contrary to common belief, mold is not unavoidable and expected, but rather the most easily prevented of all types of spoilage, say Purdue university specialists. Mold, which is found mostly on fruits and tomatoes, grows only in the presence of air. Mold is killed by temperature below the boiling point. Discarding doubtful cans and processing the food in jars rather than open kettles canning will prove reliable preventive measures.

Ribbon Poisons Locust A new substance called gammexane, with which long ribbons are saturated, is being produced in Scotland as a weapon against the locust plague which periodically devastate large areas of the world. It was first tried out during the locust plague in Sardinia last year when it effectively stopped the advance of locusts by bringing immediate death to those coming in contact with the spread-out rolls.

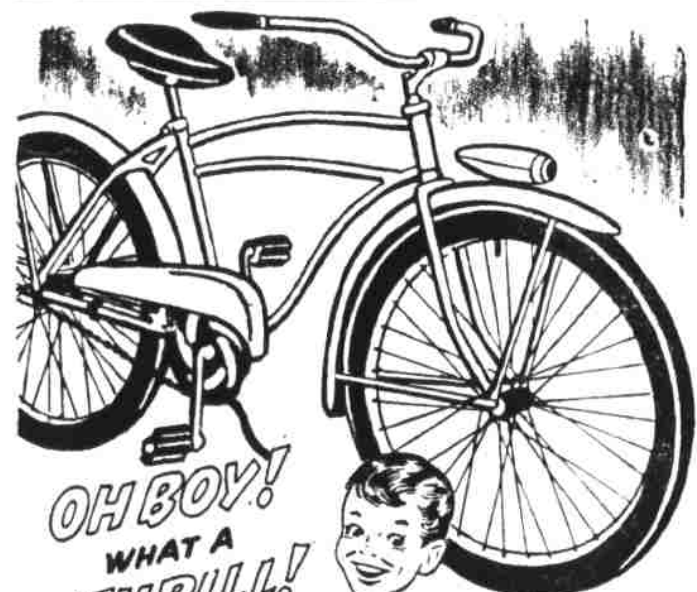
