Ezekiel told his people that the Lord was displeased because the "shepherds" or priests of the exiled Israelites were grown rich and let the "sheep" the common people, starve spiritually.



The good shepherd, Ezekiel said, seeks out his flocks where they are scattered through the high mountains, prey to every wild beast of the country, and feeds and cares for them.



The prophet cheered them by promising that God would take His scattered children back to their own land, would give them "clean hearts," and it would become as the garden of Eden.



Ezekiel was taken to a valley of dry bones and commanded to give them life, and because a man's life is as the breath of life, it would become as the garden of Eden.

Sunday School Lesson

God's Message to a People in Exile

HIGHLIGHTS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Scripture—Ezekiel 18; 34; 36:22-38; 37:1-14.

EZEKIEL'S PROPHECIES were written, it is thought, between 585 and 585 B. C., when he, his people and the king, Jehoiachin, were exiled in Babylon. All the people were homesick and discouraged. They needed cheering (even as we of today), but they also should look clearly at the facts and see where at least part of the blame for their condition lay, so thought Ezekiel.

Ezekiel evidently did not believe in vicarious righteousness, and placed his emphasis on personal responsibility. He told his people plainly that they needed "a new heart." That phrase has a familiar ring. After the dropping of the atomic bomb, Winston Churchill is reported to have said that "man must have a new heart," and a well-known American to have remarked that the world's thinking must undergo a "cleansing and reformation" if we would survive.

Like all the Old Testament prophets, Ezekiel repeated to his people only what the Lord told him. God came to him, he said, and asked what the children of Israel meant by the saying that "The fathers have eaten sour grapes and the children's teeth are set on edge?" All souls are none, the Lord said, "as the soul of the father, so also the soul of the son is mine; the soul that sinneth, it shall die."

MEMORY VERSE

"They shall know that I, Jehovah their God, am with them."—Ezekiel 34:30.

The Jews still are scattered over the face of the earth, and those who are in exile in lands where they have lost all their possessions and are truly "displaced persons," are homesick and heartsick, longing for homes and security. Ezekiel promised his exiles that God would take care of them, bring them together in their own land, where He would help them to make the land blossom and bear fruit like the Garden of Eden.

The closing verses of our lesson today tell the parable of the valley of dry bones to which the Lord transported Ezekiel. As Ezekiel "prophesied" over them, the bones were assembled into human skeletons, the skeletons were clothed with flesh, muscle, skin, etc., and the breath of life was blown into them by the four winds of heaven.

When this latter was accomplished, there was a "great army," symbolizing the restoration of a great nation.

We of today are not looking forward to a great army or a great nation. We want a great world of brotherhood and justice, and that is the ideal to which we are working, with God's help.

Empty barrels give out only noise. Don't forget that when you are listening to abusive language or administering it.
 A letter from a disturbed correspondent presents a familiar picture. She has been married for more than 25 years. Her husband is irreligious, "cannot stand to hear the name of God mentioned; curses until it is almost unbearable to hear, and when I tell him to please stop, he tells me that it is his own home and he will curse in it all he wants to." In addition to this he has for years had periodic affairs with other women. This correspondent wants some sort of an answer to her problem.
 The answer is, "empty barrels." Just how many empty barrels are involved, I don't know. Quite evidently the husband is one, being empty of happiness, and is fighting against the inner call of Almighty God to lead a good life. How some men and women fight that call! Cheated in the image of God, every man has within him a divine spark which reaches out to contact its Creator. The only way to overcome that upward urge is to fight against it with a downward urge.
 The home itself may be another empty barrel. The husband may not find happiness and contentment there, and may be seeking it elsewhere. He may be craving attention, and getting it by heaping abuse on his wife. Both husbands and wives try this trick in the home to get attention when it is not given to them voluntarily.
 The wife herself evidently has some impetus of spirit. If she was in full contact with the Lord, she would be able to work the prayer lever on her husband.

ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY-SCHOOL LESSON

Scripture—Ezekiel 18; 34; 36:22-38; 37:1-14.

There is nothing like bringing God's power to bear, by remote control, upon one whom we desire to help, but to whom we dare not speak about spiritual things.
 I would say that this home needed some spiritual housecleaning. The place to begin is for the wife to start on herself. She may think she does not need it, but the fact that she admits that she can do nothing for the profane husband, indicates that she does need something. Even if she does not lecture him, nag at him, she is not bringing a positive influence for good to bear upon him. Evil can be overcome with good. Let her establish close communion with her Lord, give herself to heart-searching prayer for herself and her husband, try letting her actions speak louder than her words. Then let her work the prayer lever, and work it hard.
