Scott's Jersey and Holstein cows will give to better milk, and Johnson could be no better financier than he has shown himself to be in pulling North Carolina out of the financial quagmire in which it was buried when he took office. Scott could well become a front man for the dairy industry, however, and Johnson might become one of the outstanding investment bankers in the South.

Where Salmon Go In Deep Sea To Be Subject Of Search

SEATTLE (UP)—They're going to take a look into the home life of deep sea fish along the West Coast. The denizens of the seas won't have any more privacy than gold fish in a bowl.

The fisheries departments of California, Oregon and Washington have formed a tri-state commission to study the habits of fish. Part of the study will concern salmon, especially silvers and chinooks.

C. I. Anderson, assistant director of Washington state fisheries, said that of the five species of salmon which make up the \$36,000,000-a-year industry, only silvers and chinooks are landed in all three states.

Heretofore, the home life of the salmon in deep water has been kept pretty well secret. "Where From There?" "We know about salmon when they hit fresh-water streams. What happens then is obvious," Anderson said. "We want to know through the salt seas. That's got us baffled."

Anderson said silvers and chinooks are caught from California to Alaska, both commercially and by sportsmen.

"But merely catching the fish doesn't tell us anything. They may be headed for streams in any of those areas. That's what we want to know. Where they are headed while at sea."

Anderson said the commission will start by tagging silvers and chinooks caught by trawlers. "We'll send men out on boats," Anderson said. "They will remove a certain number of hooked fish carefully so as not to injure them. The fish will be tagged through the dorsal fin, then measured and released."

Like a Poll

A comparatively small number of several thousand of tagged fish should do the trick, Anderson said. "Gallup takes only a few sample polls and usually can predict the outcome of elections. It should work with fish," he said. "We should be able to tell by this method where they go."

When tagged fish are caught, the fisherman will look at the discs and relay the information to the departments, stating where they were caught.

"Thus, we will be able to solve the mystery," he said. "There are more fish in the sea than have ever been caught. "And we'll know about them too before long."

Many Accept Jobs In Draft Board Reserve In N. C.

Of the 619 former Selective Service Board members and appeals agents who were offered appointments in the new state Selective Service Reserve, 384 have accepted, 145 have declined and no answers have yet been received from 90 others, Adjt.-Gen. J. Van B. Metts stated in Raleigh this week.

Of the former members of Haywood county board No. 1, G. C. Ferguson declined re-appointment. Dr. Tom Stringfield has stated that he would accept, and the decision of T. L. Green has not been learned.

James E. Henderson, W. W. Mitchell and Harley E. Wright, who composed the Canton area board, have all accepted appointment in the reserve set-up.

Vacancies on the local boards will be filled, it was explained by the adjutant general, from recommendations made by local committees composed in each county of the clerk of Superior Court, the chairman of the county board of elections and county superintendent of education. There are 155 local boards in North Carolina.

2nd 'American House' Is Opened In Berlin

Naval Flyer Is Serving With Night Fighter Detachment on 'Philippine Sea'

BERLIN (UP)—The American Military Government has opened the second "American House" information center, after the first had won patronage which overtaxed its facilities.

In these centers the Germans have free use of well-stocked American libraries and magazine rooms. They are invited to lectures and films and shown exhibits describing the American scene and the American way of life.

The Russians were first in the field here with their big and well-appointed "House of Soviet Culture," and the Americans are now working hard to out-strip them.

The newest "American House" is directed by Dr. Erude Gunther, Danzig-born assistant professor of German literature on leave of absence from Vassar.

Her "house" is established in an eight-room former dwelling. She is building a library which eventually will contain 3,000 volumes. On the walls are pictures of New York, Chicago and other American cities, numerous American authors and educational leaders.

In the film rooms are documentary films. In the lecture room German and American speakers appear and mixed discussion groups meet to exchange ideas.

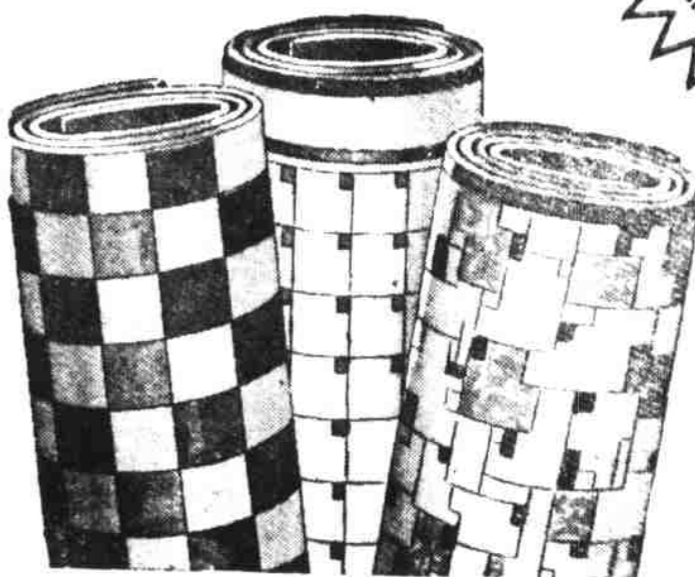
Dr. Gunther also has plans for the formation of a German American club composed of educators, journalists and artists. She has found that Germans are hungry for American fiction and most of the shelves will be filled with such books.

Tar Heels Lead Nation In Church Relief Drive

North Carolina's record of relief giving through Church World Service for 1948 stands at 435,000 pounds this week, according to the latest bulletin from the Church World Service Center, New Windsor, Md., through which most gifts have been sent. Leading the nation for the second time in the last twelve months, North Carolina's contributions of shoes, clothing and bedding came largely as a result of a state-wide collection sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Pennsylvania, second on the list of states by contributions is 100,000 pounds behind North Carolina. Cash gifts to the interdenominational relief agency from the Tar Heel state since January amount to over \$4,000. Financial support for the relief work of the organization comes mainly from the 21 major Protestant and Orthodox groups which are its members.

Church World Service has, since January 1 this year, shipped more than 16 million pounds of relief and reconstruction supplies, valued at \$5,500,000, according to the last report from the New York headquarters.

During the first three months of this year, 500 shipments of food, clothing, medicines and supplies were sent to aid destitute people in many parts of the world. CWS officials reported. Altogether, people in more than thirty countries of Europe and Asia were aided by the program.

Seventy-five percent of the supplies went to help countries in Europe. The remaining goods went to aid refugees, flood victims, church

sponsored institutions, children, religious workers and others in need in Asiatic countries. Four million pounds of clothing and more than 11 million pounds of food stuffs were included in shipments during this period.

The high percentage of foodstuffs is accounted for by the recent Abraham Lincoln Friendship Train, whose ton of mid-western states netted more than 8,000,000 pounds of gifts from the rural church people of the country. Bulk wheat, rye, corn, flour, powdered milk, canned foods, lard and other staples made up most of the train's cargo.

Other shipments during the January - March period included several thousand dollars worth of drugs and medical and surgical supplies to re-equip mission hospitals in several countries and to better equip mobile and other medical units in disease ridden areas of India, Pakistan and Burma. Several hundred pounds of garden seeds for family gardens in Poland, Finland, Austria, Germany, France, and other countries were sent in time for spring planting.

(Continued from Editorial Page) be reclaimed by planting protective cover crops. Steeply sloping land should be removed from cultivation altogether and devoted to pasturage. Barren spots can be planted to forest.

"The only way this country can be saved from going down Tobacco Road to the poorhouse is by applying on a national scale same principles and same enthusiastic cooperation. But it cannot be done overnight. It will take years, possibly generations, to do the job."

"What we need - and it has been said many times - is a national land policy, to give us a complete picture of what has to be done, and to co-ordinate county, state and national efforts in getting it done."

A bill attempting to formulate a comprehensive program of that kind has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Clifford R. Hope, Republican of Kansas, chairman of the Committee on Agriculture.

The preamble of the bill (H. R. 6054) is a confession of our folly in failing to follow the laws of nature, and a solemn pledge to turn over a new leaf. It declares war upon waste of nature's most needed gift. It sets forth a line of strategy and tactics, and would unify command under the Secretary of Agriculture, in whom such authority should be vested - provided, of course, that future appointees to that most responsible position will have the character, courage and capacity to carry out so difficult and controversial a program.

This unification is quite as important as the unification of command of our armed forces. The latter is necessitated by the fear of possible attack by a foreign foe. The former is needed to remove the fear of future famine.
