- Braised Round Steak with Onions and Carrots
 - Mashed Potatoes
 - Lettuce and Tomato Salad
 - French Dressing
 - Bread and Butter
 - Double Boiler Chocolate Graham Pudding* Beverage
- *Recipe for Starred Dish Follows:

- Double Boiler Chocolate Graham Pudding
 - 2 tablespoons shortening
 - 1/3 cup sugar
 - 1 egg, separated
 - 1 square (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate
 - 1/2 cup bottled milk or 1/4 cup evaporated milk and 1/4 cup water
 - 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
 - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Cream shortening, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg yolk and mix well; add chocolate and blend. Stir in milk. Mix graham cracker crumbs, baking powder and salt together; add and mix well. Fold in egg white which has been stiffly beaten. Turn into greased top of 1 1/2-quart double boiler; cover and cook over boiling water for 1 1/2 hours. (Replenish boiling water when necessary.) Turn out pudding and serve with thin cream or foamy sauce. Makes 6 servings.

- Roquefort Cheese Dressing
- 1/2 cup Roquefort cheese
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 6 tablespoons wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon celery salt
- Salt to taste
- Dash of freshly ground pepper
- Mash cheese, add oil slowly, blending them together well. Add vinegar, a tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Add celery salt, salt to taste and pepper and mix thoroughly. Beat well before pouring over salad greens.

Carrot Cheese Puff

- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup milk
 - 1 cup (about 1/4 pound) grated yellow cheese
 - 2 eggs, separated
 - 1 cup soft bread crumbs (about 2 slices)
 - One 1/2-ounce container strained baby-foot carrots
- Melt butter or margarine over low heat; add flour and salt and blend until smooth. Remove from heat, add milk gradually, stirring until smooth after each addition. Return to heat and stir constantly until thickened. Add cheese and continue cooking until cheese has melted, stirring as you do so. Remove from heat and add slightly beaten egg yolk; mix. Add bread crumbs and carrots and mix well. Allow to stand for a few minutes. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour in greased casserole and bake

To stretch or not to stretch skin always has been a controversial subject. Some doctors and cosmeticians claim that stretching skin and muscles of the face and throat will help keep skin young and flexible, improve texture and color and firm the contour. Others say no.

Of course, facial exercises alone cannot improve your complexion. You also must observe the basic principles of correct cleansing. That means thoroughly cleansing at least twice a day.

Use a mild complexion soap that does not irritate. There are mildly medicated soaps which are highly effective in clearing up blackheads and pimples. In the case of such skin disturbances you may safely use an emollient ointment containing sulphurated petrolatum and oxyquinoline, suggest skin doctors.

TURN YOUR CHIN... Bend your head to shoulder, right then left. Big pull.
