from the residential areas, and will not prove to be offensive to any area.

The Hazelwood board of aldermen have also been looking for a site to use for their garbage disposal, and The Mountaineer learned from members of both town boards that a meeting will be held shortly and discuss the possibility of the two towns owning and operating the 43-acre tract.

Hazelwood used the Waynesville incinerator for some time until the load got beyond the capacity of the plant.

Plans are to dismantle the present incinerator, and use the brick for manholes, and sell the steel. The property will also be offered for sale.

The incinerator was built as a WPA project and cost about \$3,500.

The property which the town bought has a nice house, and this will provide living quarters for the man who will be in charge of burning the garbage. A road will have to be cut to one of the several gulches in the property. The town plans to begin utilizing the site at once.

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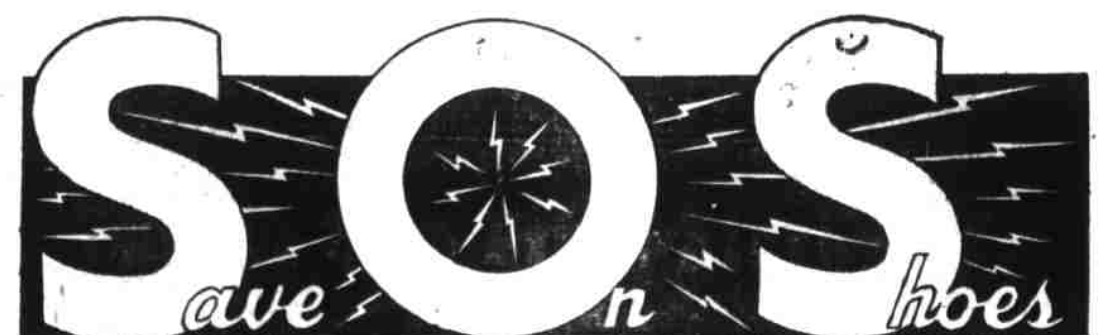
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
