Milk Production Courses Set For 2 Nights This Week

Two short courses for dairymen in the production of milk will be led by Wayne Corpening, county agent, and Lyle Jones, county sanitarian, at the county courthouse on Thursday and Friday nights.

All persons handling milk or milk utensils, and milkers or persons connected with the production of milk are urged to be present.

Mr. Jones will preside at the meetings. C. S. Thomas, district sanitarian from the state health department, will make a few introductory remarks at the Thursday night meeting. A sound picture will follow on the "Science of Milk Production". Farm agent Corpening and Dr. A. R. Riegg will discuss the movie.

Dr. Riegg will discuss the feeding of cows. A strip film will then be shown, "What Is Quality Milk?" H. O. Bealmear, state sanitarian, will lead a discussion of the film.

Mr. Bealmear, Mr. Corpening, and Dr. Riegg will answer any questions at the close of Thursday's program.

The Friday night schedule will have R. L. Caviness, sanitary engineer for the State Board of Health, making the introductory remarks. A strip film, "What Is Bacteria," will be shown. Mr. Bealmear will discuss the film. Another movie, "Quality Milk Production," will also be shown.

Maurice Gaston will speak on "Using Proved Bulls". A strip film will be run on "The Problem of Bacteria in Milk." Mr. Caviness will close the meeting with a question period.

Refreshments will be served at the courses.

Attention, All Citizens!

Working in cooperation with our health department, the towns of Waynesville and Hazelwood are doing everything in their power to prevent polio and other diseases. Places that might harbor or breed flies are being sprayed and frequent inspections are made to discover conditions that might endanger the health of our citizens. Contact is being maintained with experts to the end that no steps believed effective in combating flies and insects will be neglected.

A general and thorough community-wide spraying program is scheduled to begin Tuesday morning, with weather permitting. The outsides of buildings, lawns, shrubbery and streets will be sprayed with 2% DDT. All citizens everywhere are urged to spray the inside of their homes and places of business. With the cooperation of every citizen, the menace of flies and insects can be conquered in this area. It is further suggested that the following measures be followed:

Clean garbage cans and spray with insecticide at least once a week. Keep garbage and waste cans covered.

Clean up and spray all dangerous breeding spots—empty tin cans, rotted brush, leaves, compost heaps, rubbish, outdoor toilets, etc.

Swat and bomb flies daily—start now—make it a daily task of some member of your family to swat or bomb any fly having courage enough to enter your home.

The spraying now being done by the towns is not harmful to garden, crops, animals or family. If any spot on your premises has been overlooked, and you cannot properly spray it, notify the police.

See that every member of your family washes his hands before eating. Be very sure of the cleanliness of the food you serve. Wash all fruits and vegetables thoroughly.

Once your doorstep is clean. HELP YOUR NEIGHBOR. Remember, this is a community job and you yourself when you help your neighbor.

These steps are strongly urged to remove conditions which might cause polio. You will observe that they should also be effective in combating other diseases which originate from neglect of the ordinary rules of health.

Show your active interest in this campaign by operating to the fullest extent. Advise with any problem confronting you to the health department.
