**New Projects Planned At Clyde School This Year**

The Fall term of Clyde School got off to a successful start last week with preliminary reports at end of the first five days showing an enrollment of 569 for the combined elementary grades and high school.

Registration figures for the first week, while not complete, showed an increase of 9 pupils over the number enrolled during the first two weeks last year. Teachers' reports to Stanley Livingston, new principal who came to Clyde this year from the New School in McDowell County, showed an enrollment of 124 for the high school, 4 less than at opening of the 1947 school year. Enrollment for grades one through eight had reached 445 by Friday.

An accurate registration total and report on teacher load (number of pupils per teacher) will not be available before the latter part of this week, as further adjustments are to be made, it was pointed out by the principal.

During the afternoon, the teaching-promoting special activities during the current school year and to discuss matters pertaining to library schedules and the transportation of students by school buses.

Schedule for regular chapel programs, to be sponsored mostly by class groups within the school, will be announced later. Livingston said a few outside speakers will be brought in for special occasions.

Plans are also underway for publication of a school newspaper, likely a weekly publication to be prepared in mimeograph form by the students with the aid of faculty advisors. The school has not published a paper for the past several years.

Boys and girls of the Clyde School this year will participate actively in a physical education program which is to include basketball competition with school teams throughout the county. Robert C. Evans, agricultural teacher, will coach basketball for both boys and girls. A schedule for "light" practice is being prepared now and the periods of practice are to begin within the next week or so, Mr. Livingston said.

The addition of typing and speech courses this Fall makes a total of 22 subjects which are being offered by the school this term. This is a part of the school's long-range program for adding courses to meet the students' requests and

needs wherever possible.

Since the school has no librarian this year, arrangements have been made for two teachers to be supervisors with student assistants to help with the work. Mrs. Lyle Jones, public school music teacher, is to be in charge of the elementary library and Miss Betty Bass, who teaches typing, speech, and English will be high school librarian.

The school cafeteria opened a week ago and lunches now are being served daily to pupils and teachers.

Mr. Livingston has announced the official time for beginning of the school day as 8:40 a. m. and the closing bell rings at 3:15 p. m.

Brooks, eighth; and Mrs. Jones, public school music. High school teachers are Homer Henry, mathematics, history, and general business; Miss Bass, typing, English, and speech; Mrs. Edith Y. White, home economics and health; Mr. Evans, agriculture; Miss Martha K. Sandlin, English and French; and Mr. Livingston, science.
