Court Rules In Favor Of Beer-Wine Election

Attempts to prevent holding of an election in Avery county on the question of outlawing sales of beer and wine ended in failure in the State Supreme Court today—long after the election, which resulted in a dry victory, was held.

Giant Farm Project Opens Near Charlotte

Giant earth-moving machines will face-lift the 120-acre Kelly brothers farm near Charlotte today, in a demonstration in which man attempts to reverse the evil effects of many years of erosion and neglect and poor farming. Some 350 men and 125 machines will be engaged in the operation.

Jackson County Man Gets Long Prison Term

Raymond Nations, 23, of the Wilmont section of Jackson county, drew a 15 to 20 year term in state prison at hard labor for the shotgun slaying of Donald Bradley, 23, last spring.

Sentence was passed by Judge Hoyle Sink of Lexington, who is presiding over the October criminal term of the Jackson County Superior Court.

Noland Discusses Rural Roads Improvement

Buncombe county residents who want rural roads improved had their questions answered yesterday by D. Reeves Noland of Waynesville, 10th division highway commissioner.

Mr. Noland said that under the present budget setup rural road funds are available only for maintenance purposes and not for construction or hard-surfacing.

"The only way we can have good, or new, roads is through a bond issue or increasing the gasoline tax with the provision that additional revenue be specifically allocated for construction of rural roads," he said.

Cannon's Trial May Be Postponed

Solicitor W. K. McLean said today that Vaughan Cannon probably would not be tried on gambling charges for two or three months. Cannon is at liberty under \$15,000 bond on charges of operating a gambling house and conspiracy to operate a gambling house.

Rogers Gets Sentence For Assaulting Mother

John Henry Rogers, 47-year-old Fruitland resident, was sentenced yesterday at Hendersonville by superior court Judge Dan K. Moore to serve 10 years in state prison for assaulting his 79-year-old mother and an additional two years for assaulting his wife.

Judge Moore also ordered a special venire of 25 Polk county residents to try the case of Jesse J. Lyda of Fruitland on a charge of shooting and seriously wounding Deputy Sheriff J. O. Nix near Fruitland, August 25.

Hoey Says Truman Will Carry State

Senator Clyde Hoey, of Shelby, predicted today that "President Truman will get North Carolina's electoral vote, it can now be said with definite assurance." Hoey has just completed a campaign swing which carried him over most of the state.

County Republicans Hear Pritchard At Canton Rally

Mr. Pritchard told his audience that he favors improved school buildings, an increase in teachers' pay, a revised old-age assistance program, improvement to rural roads and the reduction of the state's automobile license fee to \$5.00.

Mr. Candler spoke briefly during the program, and Joe Pressley, Haywood's Republican candidate for representative, appeared on the platform. He also led in the entertainment program with members of his string band, and "Pan-handle Pete" of West Asheville.
