The altar was decorated with vases of white gladiolus, white chrysanthemums, palms, and ivy and was flanked with branched candelabra holding lighted tapers.

A program of wedding music was presented by Miss Janice Smathers of Clyde, pianist, and Miss Margaret Ensley, cousin of Mr. Ensley, soprano. Miss Smathers played "Clair de Lune," by Debussy and "Indian Love Call" from "Rose Marie." Miss Ensley sang "Ave Maria," and "Because." 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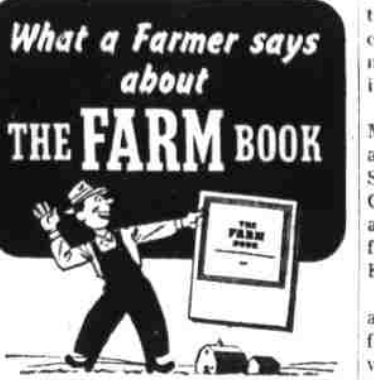
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Miss Kluttz Is Feted At Bridge-Shower
