John Price Harrod, Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs. John Price Harrod of Waynesville. The ceremony took place in the 49th General Hospital in Tokyo, Japan on Saturday, November 13. The Rev. Philip Sullivan, Catholic chaplain, officiated at the double-ring ceremony.

The bride was given in marriage by Col. Grady, commanding officer of the 49th General Hospital. She wore a gown of white slipper satin fashioned with sweetheart neckline, full skirt and a short train, and the front was embroidered with seed pearls. She carried a showered arm bouquet of white carnations and white lilies.

Lt. Janet Gottloh of Omaha, Nebraska, was maid of honor and Capt. Vivian Shepherd was bridesmaid. Capt. Floyd Jennell of Butler, Georgia, served as best man.

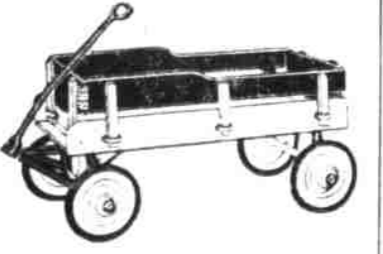
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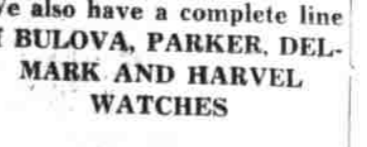

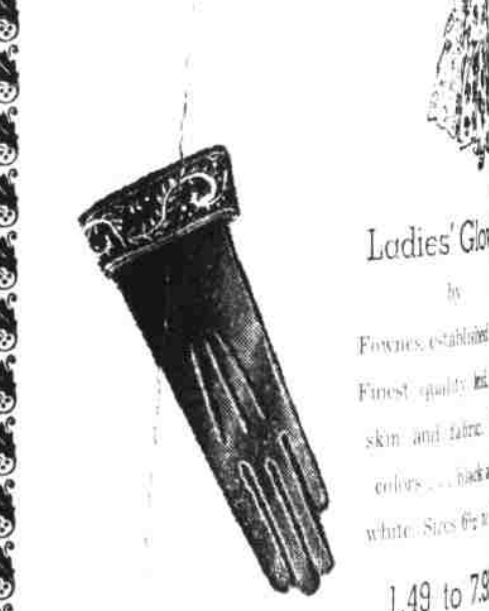
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
