Unduly Excited—Now The Facts Clear The Matter

It is a source of genuine satisfaction that The Marshall News-Record, speaking for the people of Madison County, now has a thorough understanding of the Newport-Waynesville highway and its relation to a proposed road through Marshall.

For several weeks the Marshall newspaper has been taking The Mountaineer and D. Reeves Noland, highway commissioner, to task in its editorial columns about the highway. The Marshall editor felt that the proposed Newport-Waynesville highway would take from them the proposed inter-regional defense road, as proposed by the war department.

After two weeks of lengthy editorials the Mountaineer held a conference with the Marshall editor and this, backed by a full letter of explanation by Mr. Noland, has apparently gotten the matter straightened out.

It was just a matter of not understanding that there are two different projects, neither having anything to do with the other. The whole thing started when a reporter for a daily newspaper became confused and threw explosive statements into an article about the two kindred projects, yet two entirely different projects.

Such things create undue excitement, and unrest, but when the parties sit down and calmly go over the facts, the situation is easily cleared and everyone has a better understanding. That is exactly what has happened on these two highway matters. Now everyone is happy—all is forgiven, and everything is forgotten.

As for The Mountaineer, we accept the apology in a spirit of sincere forgiveness.

Is it normal for a co-ed to be homesick?

Answer: Not for long, at any rate, writes Annalies A. Rose of Smith College in the Journal of Social Psychology. On the basis of a study of 66 women freshmen in their first five weeks at college, Dr. Rose concludes that "well-adjusted" girls, particularly those who have no trouble making contacts with the opposite sex, are not homesick at all. Those who have one attack of homesickness after another are emotionally weak and childish, while the personalities of girls who are homesick only once show comparatively "minor deviations" from the normal.
