Resolution Adopted

W. G. Byers presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted by the group:

"Be it resolved that the Haywood County Farm Bureau in convention duly assembled in the Haywood County Courthouse, Saturday, January 22, go on record favoring the Huskins resolution before the committee for consideration of reduction of warehouse charges on burley tobacco from 4% to 2%." Be it further resolved that we urge our Representative in the Legislature, Hon. Grover C. Davis, to use his best efforts in securing the passage of said Huskins resolution. This resolution was seconded by Joe Palmer, and by unanimous vote of the 41 members present the motion carried."
