Scripture—Luke 4:14-15.

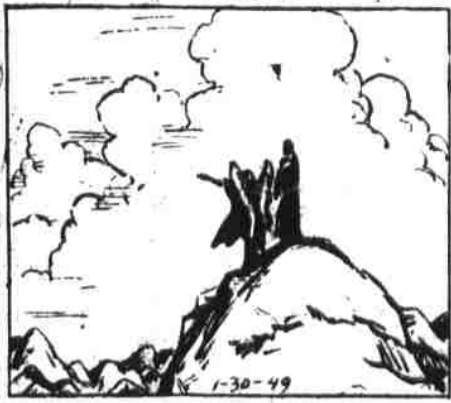

Few people pay much attention to the Fire Department until their house catches on fire. Then they want a fire truck in a hurry. Even those who have had their home saved by the fire department often forget as time goes on.

Let's don't forget that fire which ran through the southland last summer. The polio epidemic—worst in the recollection of most of us. One newspaper headlined it as "The Most Tragic Story of the Year."

Those families touched by it will agree to this title. When that fire commenced raging there was a fire department which came to our rescue with its fullest resources — The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

We did what we could as polio soared during the summer with the heat. A ban against places of public assembly was established for those under sixteen years of age. Swimming pools shut down. Sunday School closed. Children were kept away from theatres. House to house health inspection started. DDT was fogged by trucks and airplanes.

All the while the National Foundation threw its resources, personnel and equipment into the campaign to fight this fire. Then those annual "March of Dimes" began to pay off for us. Trained specialists came into our hospitals financed by the National Foundation.

They treated our children. They provided things for many of us which we could not have afforded personally. As the result, the lives of many of our children were saved, and their health reclaimed. Polio also reached out and touched the young adult group.

The combined resources of the National Foundation to which goes the annual "March of Dimes" each year throughout the country came to our help.

Now that the fire has subsided and headlines no longer cry "Polio," let's not forget the firemen. The fire may break out again next year in another part of the country. As we last summer, they may not be able to cope with the situation alone.

So let's throw every resource we have in supporting the current "March of Dimes". Let's replenish the fire department. The National Foundation is devoting continuing efforts to discovering the cause and cure for polio. Like our local fire department they must be ever in readiness to answer a call of need, and discover every possible new way to combat this scourge of young people and children.

No one knows where fire will strike and when—whether it will be a fire which burns your home, the fire of an epidemic, the fire of alcoholism, the fire of disease, the fire of sin. The Bible reminds us, "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."

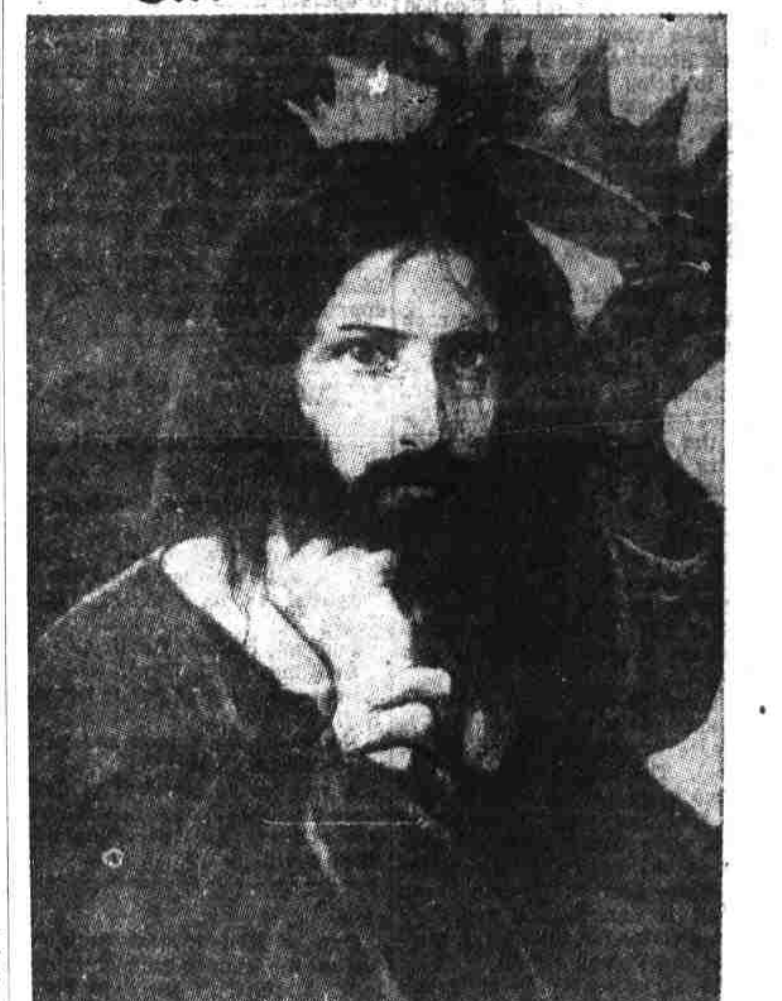

Horses Cause Many Accidents On The Farm

Horses are not considered dangerous animals, yet they account for more accidents of a serious nature than any other farm animal. Wayne Corpening, county agent for the State College Extension Service, pointed out today.

"According to the National Safety Council, approximately three times as many accidents occur with horses as with any other farm animal," Mr. Corpening said. He explained that this is a good time of the year to check thoroughly all equipment to be used with horses in the spring work, and to make necessary repairs.

Only strong harnesses should be used and these harnesses should be inspected periodically and kept in good repair. Dry leather has low tensile strength, and this is a good time to put the harnesses in condition by thoroughly cleaning them with a mild soap and warm water and oiling them with a good harness oil. Attention to equipment such as neck-yokes, tongues, single-tree and double-trees and cinches is also very necessary.

The National Safety Council suggests that many serious accidents can be prevented by following these simple rules in the handling of horses:

1. Never approach a horse without speaking to him.
2. When cleaning a stall, make no sudden movement. Enter the stall on the left side of the horse.
3. When driving or leading horses, never wrap the lines around your body or tie the lead rope to yourself.
4. Never leave a team standing unattended without securely tying it.
5. Always consider the welfare of the horse. Do not permit flies or other annoyances to torment him. Follow a definite system for brushing, harnessing and otherwise handling a horse.

Jesus Was Tempted, Just as We Are

SATAN OFFERED HIM THE WORLD TO RULE

Scripture—Luke 4:1-13.

TEMPTATION comes to all human beings. They are tempted to lie, to take what is not theirs, to strike their enemies when angered, even to kill.

There are many small temptations, such as selfishness, ill-temper, lack of consideration for others, and modern life presents many chances to become prey to these faults.

We think of Jesus as the one perfect being in the world—without fault—and it is comforting to think that He, too, was tempted. We gain strength to meet our own temptations when we read how He resisted the evil one and remained without fault.

Jesus had been baptized by John the Baptist, and leaving the Jordan river where the baptism took place, He—led by the Holy Spirit—went to the wilderness alone. He had not yet begun his

ministry, and this period of 40 days in solitude was perhaps His preparation for it.

However, He was not left alone. Satan—arch-enemy of the good—came to Him, bent on mischief. After days of fasting in the wilderness, the Lord was hungry—even as you and I would have been. That was natural even for Jesus in His human form. Satan pointed to the stones at their feet, and said to Him, "If Thou be the Son of God, command this stone that it be made bread."

However, Jesus, quoting the Scripture, answered, "It is written, that man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God."

Could you have withstood that temptation, after fasting for days, and having the power to do as Satan suggested? The next temptation was on what we might call "a large scale." Taking Jesus up into a high mountain, Satan showed

Him "all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time."

"And the devil said unto Him, All this power will I give Thee, and the glory of them: for that is delivered unto me; and to whomsoever I will I give it. If Thou therefore wilt worship me, all shall be Thine."

Jesus' answer was: "Get thee behind Me, Satan: for it is written (again quoting Scripture) Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and Him only shalt thou serve."

Thwarted the second time, the devil then took Jesus to the very top or pinnacle of the temple, and suggested that He throw Himself down. God Himself had given His angels charge over Jesus, said Satan craftily, and they would bear Him up in their hands so no harm would come to Him.
