Body Found In Creek

After a 6-day search, the body of 15-year-old Craig Stepp was found in Mud Creek, near Hendersonville. He drowned in about eight feet of water when he tried to retrieve a duck shot by a hunting companion. The body was found 300 yards from where he slipped in the swift current.

Reaches For Wrench—Killed

As Wilford T. Lewis reached for a wrench as he stood atop a 112-foot steel frame, he lost his balance and fell to his death. He was working on the framework of a support of a boiler of a new plant for Carolina Power and Light Company near Lumberton.

Woman Shot On Street

A love affair turned sour ended in death for Mary Wooten, 52-year-old mill worker, identified by Watson Stover, who pumped two bullets into her on a busy Charlotte street. Death was immediate, Stover said "the woman broke up my home." He is being held on a charge of murder. He is a truck driver and has six children. Mrs. Wooten has a crippled husband and a son.

Not Due To Injury

A doctor said that the death of a high school student, Thomas Clarence Justus, 15, of Flat Rock, who died after playing in a basketball game Friday night, was not

caused by any injury in the contest. He said that a post mortem examination showed that the student died of a brain hemorrhage. "It could have happened any time, even in sleep," said the doctor.
