

Thousands Attend Funeral Services For Sen. Broughton

RALEIGH (UP)—Leaders of the state and nation, together with hundreds of citizens who considered him their friend, paid final tribute Tuesday to Senator J. Melville Broughton. Both N. C. houses adjourned for the afternoon out of respect to the late senator.

Citizens paid their respects by filing past the casket as the body of their former governor lay in state for two hours before funeral services.

Vice President Alben W. Barkley headed the high government officials who flew from Washington for the last rites of the 60-year-old former North Carolina senator who took office only two months ago.

Sen. Clyde R. Hoey, North Carolina senator, attended with 15 other senators named Monday by Vice President Barkley.

Final rites for the Raleigh attorney and former governor were held in Raleigh's Tabernacle Baptist church where Broughton for 25 years conducted a Bible class.

Burial was in Montlawn Memorial Park.

Among those from Haywood attending the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Medford, Sam Queen and Richard Queen, who is a special secretary in the late senator's office.

Two Pasture Projects To Be Shown On Monday

Two phases of pasture work will be shown in Haywood Monday, by the county agent's office. Much stress is being placed on better pastures at this time, and Monday's program is part of this plan.

At 10:30 a tour will be made of the Jack and Hiram McCracken farm in Pigeon, near Bethel School. Last July a demonstration was made on a section of pasture there. Specialists planted Ladino clover and orchard grass, and Ladino and Fescue, according to Experiment Station recommendations.

Wayne Corpening, in a statement yesterday, said: "Now we want farmers to see what Ladino clover with orchard grass of Fescue will do. The results of the McCracken pasture are really remarkable."

At 1:30 the program will shift to the W. P. Harris farm on Beaverdam creek in Beaverdam township, when an acre of old pasture that is on thin land will be planted.

For this project, Mr. Corpening said two pounds of Ladino clover and 12 pounds of orchard grass, and fertilized with 800 pounds of 2-12-12 fertilizer.

Two Made Ill From Salt Substitutes

At least two local people who used a common table salt substitute suffered reaction, it was learned this week. Both people, past 50 years of age, stopped immediately, and suffered no serious ill effects.

Several weeks ago the U. S. Food and Drug Administration ordered the substitutes withdrawn from the market and asked all persons who were using it to "stop using this dangerous poison at once," according to an Associated Press dispatch from Washington.

The substance was described by the American Medical Association as lithium chloride. Common table salt is sodium chloride.

As far as could be learned, only a few people in this area had been using the salt substitute, and they were notified immediately when the discovery was made.

Dr. Paul B. Dunbar, commissioner of food and drugs said three manufacturing firms manufacturing the lithium salts have withdrawn them from the market. He listed the trade names of the products as Westsal, Foodsal, and Saltisal.

It was learned that local drug stores had shipped their supply of the salt back to the manufacturer.

Dr. Dunbar said symptoms of the poisoning are drowsiness, weakness, loss of appetite, nausea, shakiness of the limbs, blurred vision

The following grandsons served as pallbearers: Clyde and William O'Neal, Bud and James Justice, and Willie Clinton.

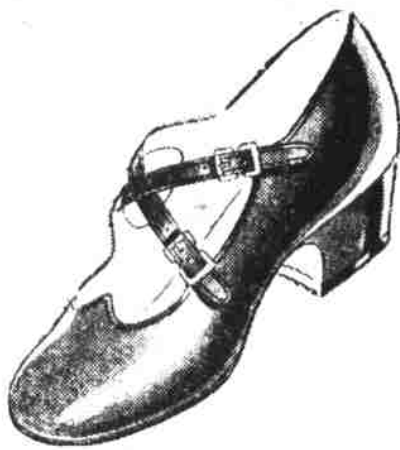

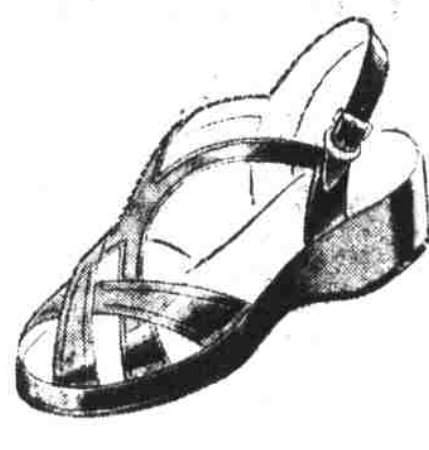
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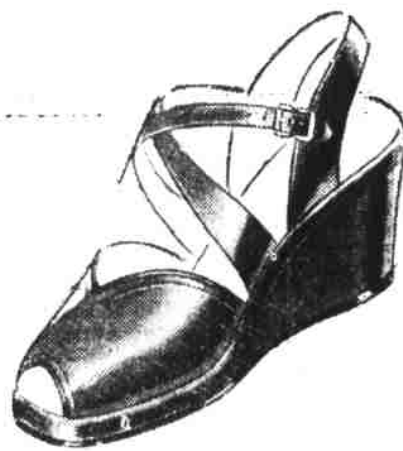
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
