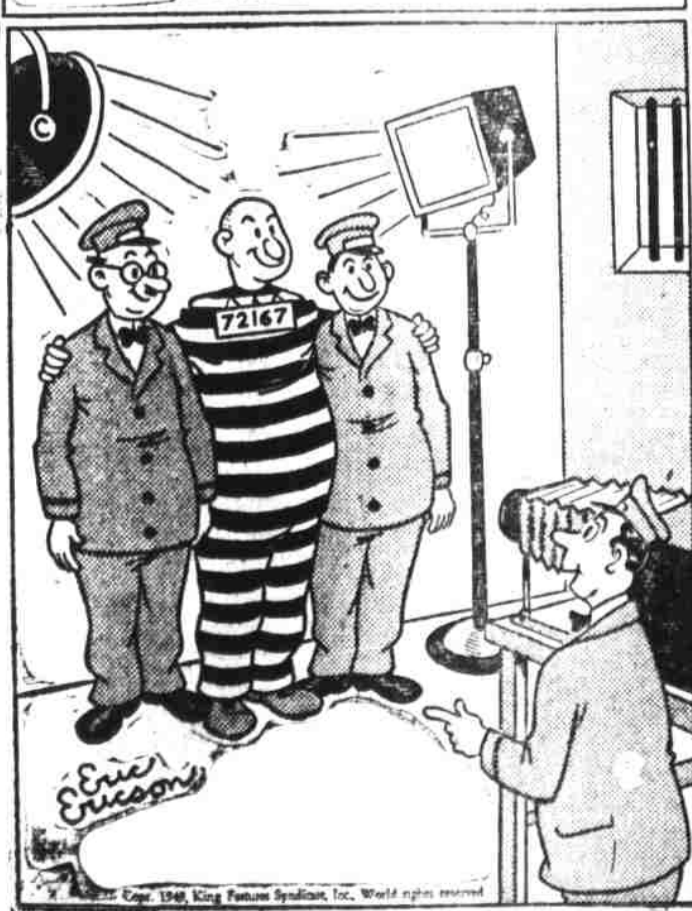

(Continued from Page D) of the first regional center at Rochester, N. Y. early in 1948, has for its long range objective the nationwide provision of blood and its derivatives, without charge for the products, to meet civilian and military needs. The four major phases involved in carrying out the blood program are: 1) collecting the blood, 2) processing it for use as whole blood and blood derivatives, 3) distributing the blood and blood products, 4) making blood available for continuous research. The Red Cross bears the entire cost of this program with funds obtained during the annual campaign. According to a statement by Mrs. Ethel Hayes Fisher, executive secretary of the Haywood County chapter, the local Red Cross will participate in the blood program this year and a blood bank will be established. A mobile unit will visit the community six times during the year to collect blood from donors. The blood thus collected will be taken to the regional center at Asheville for medical examination and typing and will then be returned to the local hospital where it will be used without charge when needed. Nearly 23,000,000 customers were served by gas utilities in the U. S. at the end of 1948.
