Outdoor Heating System Warms Racing Fans

PHOENIX, AP (UPI)—Sportsman's Park, the nation's first harness race track to hold winter

racing at night, has come up with another first.

It's a radiant heating system that maintains a 65 degree temperature in the grandstand even though the outside air registers 40.

The unit consists of pipes under the seats under the floor in the box section. Water heated to 110 degrees circulates through the pipes, giving off a uniform and comfortable temperature.

"You are starting something that is worth something when you start a new troop . . . In accepting the charter, Mr. Bowles urged his audience to "get more troops started." In reference to the development of the Boy Scouts in Haywood county, he paid tribute to the work of John Schell, Jr., scoutmaster of the new troop; John R. Carswell, chairman of the Boosters Club's troop committee; and Elbert Mills, scoutmaster of troop 3, Allens Creek, whose members went home with most of the awards presented at the Court. The club president then presented a membership card to Mr. Carswell, who in turn presented cards to Mr. Millar and Sam H. Lane of the club. Mr. Schell, Lawrence C. Davis, Paul P.
