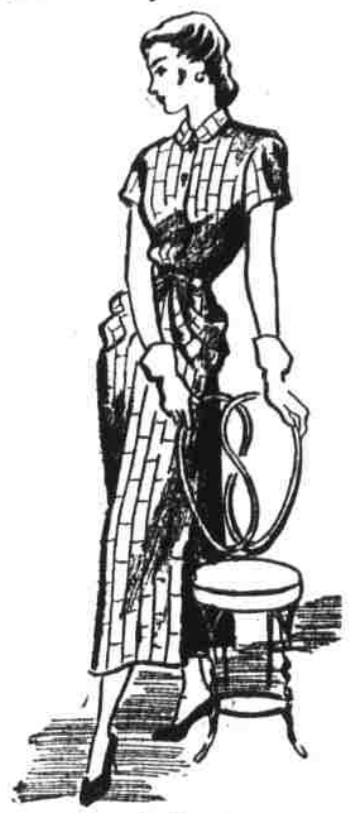


Attractive All-Day Dress
