The executive committee will make recommendations on the long-range improvement of beef cattle in the county.

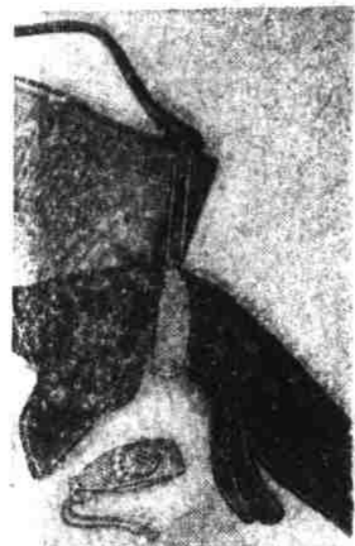
The Commission also decided to push pastures, since this crop of about 93,000 acres is the county's largest.
