

Library Thief-Catcher Too Fancy A Gadget

PHILADELPHIA (UP)-Library officials at Temple University have replaced their ingenious little magazine thief detector with the oldfashioned, but much more effective, student guard at the Sullivan Library doors.

The discarded detector, which operated on the principle of the Geiger counter, was supposed to detect radio-active substance placed in the magazines, and set off an alarm when they were taken from the room.

The device was too sensitive. however. When set too low, it did not detect all the materials leaving the room and when set too high, its oversensitiveness to atmospheric conditions resulted in continuous false alarms.
