Groups To Meet Tuesday To Talk Over Programs

Farmers of Hominy and Beaverdam communities will meet at 7:30 p. m. tomorrow at Beaverdam School in regard to the watershed test demonstration program for their area.

Wayne Corpening, Haywood County Agent, advised all those whose farms have not been mapped to attend this meeting.

He declared that farms should be mapped and requisitions for phosphate made as soon as possible to get the area on the program.

The county agent rounded Beaverdam and Hominy farmers that 75 per cent of the farms in each area has to be on the program before the area can be approved.

He said that if the farmer is unable to attend in person, he should delegate a member of his family who can make a map of the farm to attend the meeting.

"If you have a surveyor's plot, Mr. Corpening said in his notice, 'bring it along. And bring a pencil also.'"

He added: "The sooner we can get farms mapped, the quicker we can get phosphate to you. Phosphate must be out to farmers by May 15."
