

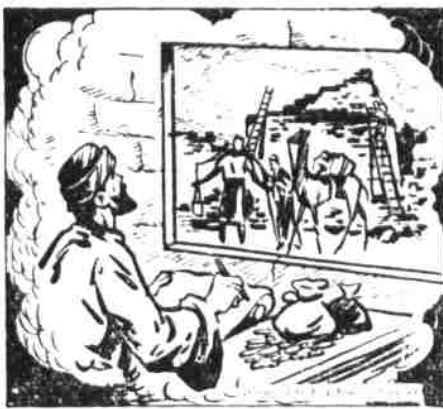

Scripture—Luke 12:16-21; 14:27-33.



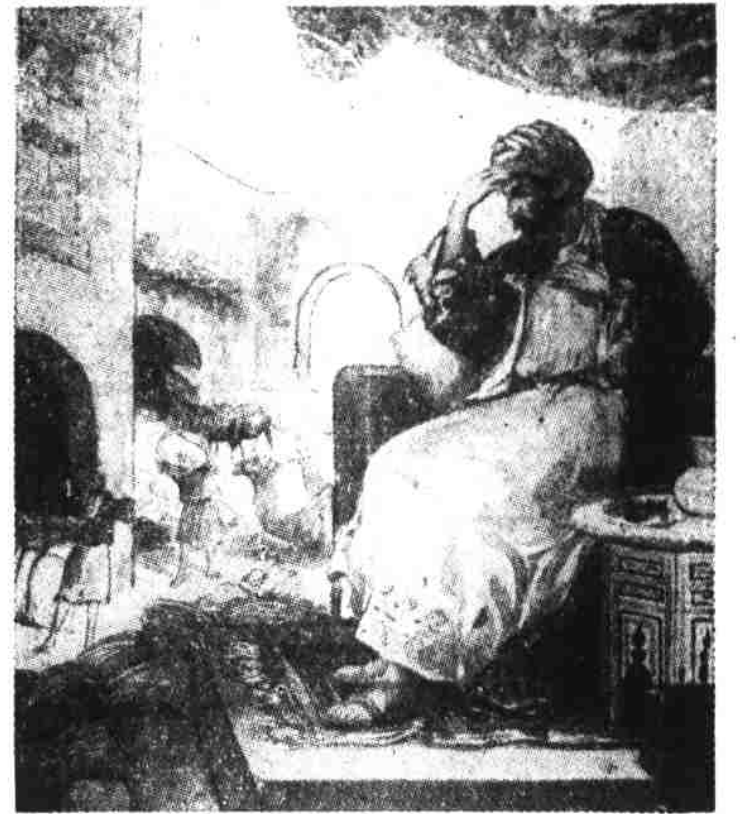

The night he made his decision, the rich man told by the Lord that very night his soul would be required of him. What then was the use of all his wealth? Jesus said this man was rich in material things, but not rich toward God.

To be a true disciple of the Lord, a man must "bear his cross," and follow in Jesus' footsteps, just as a man who intends to build a tower must count the cost before beginning work, lest he find no funds to finish and be mocked.

Haywood BTU Meeting Attracts Crowd Of 415

Four hundred and fifteen representatives from 13 Haywood county Baptist churches last Monday night attended the Association of Training Union's mass meeting at Canton's First Baptist church. All but seven of the churches which have training unions were represented. The congregation, including 7 Baptist pastors and 22 Union directors, heard the Rev. L. J. Newton, Sr., associate director of the State Training Union Department, deliver the closing message. His feature address was on the subject "Faithful in Training." In the audience also were 50 other general officers and 49 officers of the training unions. The Mt. Zion Baptist church was awarded the banner for having the largest representation at the meeting. Mrs. Sam Knight presented the award. Also featuring the session were the elimination tournament. Winners of the Junior memory book completion were: Jonetta Medford, Sammy Kake Hayes, Glenda Pressley, Howard Shoak, Jr., and Donald Livingstone, all of Clyde; and Margaret Pressley, Judith Ann Blazer and Doris Pressley of Spring Hill. Mrs. Earl Reece was in charge of this tournament in which youngsters from Clyde, Burnetts Cove and Spring Hill churches also competed. The intermediate sword drill with Marion Bridges and Mrs. P. H. Gentry in charge, was won by Grace Blanton and Joyce Frady, both of Hazelwood, over a field of contestants from Waynesville First church and Clyde. Miss Jenny Mae Husky, of the Riverside church, won the Better Speakers Tournament of which Mrs. Albert Messer was in charge, and Eugene McElmore of Spring Hill was runner-up. In the Adult Scripture Reading tournament, which Sam Saunders supervised, Mrs. Perry Smathers at Canton's First Baptist church, captured first place, and Mrs. Edwar Burnette of the Riverside church was declared alternate. 576 People At Sunday Schools Easter Boosts Church Program In Hazelwood

Easter gave the Hazelwood Church Loyalty Program a great boost. Large crowds attended Sunday school and worship services. During the special church loyalty period, sponsored by the Baptist, Methodist, Church of God, and Presbyterian churches, attendance had increased from 400 to 471 by Sunday before last.
