New Clyde Lions Club Urged To Guide Youth

An International Lions official told the charter members of the new Clyde Lions Club Thursday night that they were "the first line of defense of Clyde."

International Commissioner J. Burnette Napier of Knoxville, Tenn., who has directed the organization of the Clyde club and 70 other Lions Clubs in North Carolina, spoke at the initial meeting at the Clyde School lunch room.

The 40 Lions of the Clyde group, the sponsoring Waynesville Club, and the co-sponsoring Canton Club heard the speaker's plea to give proper guidance to the youth of the community.

"Every boy and girl," Mr. Napier, a charter member of the international organization, said, "represents an investment of \$10,000 (the cost of education)."

"If you help these youngsters to develop clean, wholesome thinking, they will return \$69,000 each on this investment, in their value to the community as good citizens and constituents of sober manpower."

"Help them," he urged, "discover their way of life."

Support the home, he advised his fellow Lions, "homes are the foundation stones in civilizations."

He urged them to "move temptations from the lives of the young girls of the community, for they are the keystones in the foundation that is the home."

"If America is to live," he continued, "we must support the church."

On education, he declared, "We are now paying one third less toward the support of education than we paid last year for cosmetics."

School teachers, he added, are the lowest paid workers in America.

"We must undergird our schools," Mr. Napier warned, "our curricula to meet the changing, change our curricula to meet the changing times. Get the curricula moved around so that when the boy comes out the assembly line he will know why he is in school."

He added, "Let's be the first line of defense of our schools."

Mr. Napier urged the members of the new club to guard their town's business enterprises, try to improve them.

"Don't send business out of town," he advised, "that's bad business."

He quoted former Secretary of the Interior Work as saying that America's first line of defense was held by her civic organizations—Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, and others.

"These organizations," he said, "contributing the quotation, comprise the force that can change the shape of American thinking in one day—the thinking that will determine America's path in peace and war."

Earlier, in discussing the achievements of the Lions Club,

he told his audience that these clubs have taken 21,000 blind beggars off the nation's streets and provided better occupations for them.

And he pointed out that North Carolina was the first state in the nation to set up a Lions Club White Cane Commission for aiding the blind.

He added the white canes with which the clubs provide the blind have saved hundreds of lives, that the 32,287 pairs of eye glasses that the Lions have given away have saved 3,221 children from blindness, that there are now 42 factories in the country where blind workers are turning out quality goods.

Mr. Napier, an engineer by profession and a Lions booster by avocation, has directed the organization of an average 50 new Lions Clubs a year over the past 20 years.

In addition to his work for Lions International, he writes for the Saturday Evening Post.

He was a member of the Louisville, Ky., Blue Grass Club when it joined seven others to organize Lions International as a service organization 31 years ago.

School Board To Hold Session

Members of the Haywood County Board of Education will meet in the Court House next Monday.

County Schools Superintendent Jack Messer said the members adjourned their regular meeting on April 4 without acting on school machinery for the next two fiscal years because the State Legislature had not taken action on the statewide legislation containing such provisions at that time.

The state school bill would set up the structure by which county education boards could handle their local matters.

The county board chairman is R. T. Messer.
